In accordance with Texas Administrative Code, Title 43, Part 1, Chapter 25, Subchapter D, Rule §25.55 (a) and (b), the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Fort Worth District is partnering with the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) to offer a virtual public hearing on district transportation projects, programs, and policies affecting bicycle use on the state highway system. Gov. Abbott backs out of first pitch at Rangers opener, blames partisan politics

Texas Gov. Greg Abbott backed out of throwing out the first pitch at the Texas Rangers' home opener Monday after Major League Baseball pulled its All-Star Game from Atlanta in response to Georgia's voting law, which opponents said would suppress minority voters.

In a letter to the Rangers, Abbott said he had been looking forward to throwing the ceremonial opening pitch, until Major League Baseball adopted "what has turned out to be a false narrative about the election law reforms in Georgia, and, based on that false narrative, moved the MLB All-Star Game from Atlanta."

"It is shameful that America's pastime is not only being influenced by partisan political politics, but also perpetuating false political narratives," Abbott said in the letter to Neil Leibman, the president of business operations and the chief oper-

ating officer for the Texas Rangers.

Abbott said the state will not seek to host the All-Star Game or any other MLB special event.

"This decision does not diminish the deep respect I have for the Texas Rangers baseball organization, which is outstanding from top to bottom," Abbott said.

Georgia's law would shorten the window for early and absentee voting, give state lawmakers more authority over local elections, and prohibit giving out food and water within 150 feet of a polling pace, according to the Washington Post.

A spokesperson for the Rangers said Abbott's office reached out to the team Monday morning to let them know he wouldn't be attending the game.

Texas lawmakers are debating voting proposals in the Legislature, including prohibiting drive-through voting and blocking election officials from sending out vote by mail applications to people who didn't request one.

Supporters of the mea-

sures say they'd enhance election integrity, a priority for Abbott, but opponents say the bills would suppress voters, particularly voters of color and those with disabilities.

North Texas State Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, floated the idea of Arlington hosting the All-Star Game on Twitter Saturday.

The free market at work," Turner said. "Obviously, the ideal city to host the MLB All Star Game is Arlington, home to the brand new Globe Life Field! If (Gov. Abbott) and (the Texas Legislature) drop the vote suppression bills now, I bet we'd have a good chance of landing this game."

A baseball source told the Star-Telegram last week that the Rangers were not under consideration to host the 2021 All-Star Game, but Rangers officials believe they are a front-runner to host the game in 2023, 2024 or 2025.

MLB frequently rewards teams that have made significant investments in their communities, such as a new ballpark, with a showcase event. The Rangers were awarded the 1995 All-Star Game the year after they opened the Ballpark in Arlington, and Atlanta was selected for the 2021 game as a reward for building SunTrust Park, which opened in 2017.

US Rep. Johnson of Texas endorses Peoples for mayor of Fort Worth

U.S. Rep. Eddie Bernice Johnson, a Dallas Democrat, weighed in on Fort Worth politics Tuesday, endorsing Deborah Peoples for mayor.

In a statement, Johnson, the most senior member of the Texas Congressional Delegation, said she believed Peoples was best suited to build partnerships with the federal government and would bring investment to Fort Worth and North Texas.

"Deborah Peoples is a very qualified candidate to attract good paying jobs and lead Fort Worth out of

this crisis," she said.

Peoples, chairwoman of the Tarrant County Democratic Party and former AT&T vice president, is running in a packed race to replace Mayor Betsy Price.

The election is May 1 with a likely runoff in June.

This is the second time a congresswoman has endorsed in the mayoral race. Republican U.S. Rep. Kay Granger supported Brian Byrd's bid in January.

Peoples has several endorsements, including from Tarrant County Commissioner Roy Brooks, State Board of Education Member Aicha Davis and Tarrant County

Constable Michael Campbell.

The national Collective Political Action Committee, which focuses on boosting Black politicians, also endorsed Peoples.

Peoples and Byrd are two of 10 candidates running for mayor.

Mattie Parker, a former chief of staff for Price, has been endorsed by the Fort Worth Police Officers Association and several prominent citizens. Steve Penate, a Real Estate broker who is campaigning to evangelicals, and councilwoman Ann Zadeh are also running.

Bedford becomes fifth Tarrant County city to surpass 100 COVID-19 deaths

Tarrant County reported 14 coronavirus deaths and 210 new cases on Monday.

County officials hadn't reported updated COVID-19 data since Thursday because of the Easter holiday. Those numbers are likely to be reported on Tuesday.

Bedford became the fifth Tarrant County city to confirm 100 or more COVID-related deaths. The others are Fort Worth, Arlington, Mansfield, and North Richland Hills.

The latest pandemic-related deaths include a Fort Worth man in his 40s, an Arlington woman in her 40s, a woman from rural Tarrant County in her 50s, an Arlington man in his 50s, a River Oaks man in his 60s, a Bedford man in his 60s, two Arlington men and a woman in their 60s, an Arlington man in his 70s, a Euless man in his 70s, two Arlington men in their 80s, and a Fort Worth man older than 90.

Two of the 14 did not have underlying health conditions, according to officials.

Tarrant County has confirmed 251,316 COVID-19 cases, including 3,314 deaths and an estimated

243,299 recoveries.

COVID-19 HOSPITALIZATIONS

Hospitalized COVID patients decreased by nine to 149 since Thursday. The pandemic high was 1,528 on Jan. 6.

COVID-19 hospitalizations remained at 3% of the total number of beds in Tarrant County and make up 4% of the 3,578 occupied beds. The rate was at a pandemic-high 38% on Jan. 10.

Confirmed COVID patients is at 3.38% of all available hospital beds in the North Central Texas Trauma Region.

HOSPITAL BEDS

Tarrant County's hospital bed occupancy decreased to 71% from 80% according to county data. Total hospital beds available increased by 457 to 1,440. The pandemic low of 661 was reported Jan. 4.

ICU BEDS

Adult ICU bed occupancy decreased to 84% from 88% as of Sunday. The pandemic high was 99% on Dec. 28.

Ventilator use increased by 11 to 193. Patients are using 25% of the 785 ventilators in the county.

POSITIVITY RATE

The COVID-19 testing

positivity rate for Tarrant County was at 7% as of March 30 in the latest available seven-day average data. The rate was last at a pandemic-high 30% on Jan. 7.

Police: Saginaw rabbi used influence as clergyman to coerce, sexually assault woman

A Saginaw rabbi is accused of sexually assaulting a woman inside a synagogue, according to court documents.

Rabbi Mark Aaron Griffin, 47, was indicted on a sexual assault charge in December 2020. A search warrant filed by the Saginaw Police Department on March 31 provided more details into the case.

A woman told police in September 2020 that Griffin sexually assaulted her inside the Sar Shalom

synagogue on Bluebonnet Street, according to court documents. Griffin wanted her to be his concubine and used religious texts to try and convince her that she should be his second wife, she said, according to the search warrant. He told her God had given her to him as a gift.

On one occasion, she told him "no," and he sexually assaulted her, according to the search warrant. The detective on the case wrote in the search warrant that he believed Griffin used his influence as a clergyman to coerce the woman into sex.

The search warrant was filed in order for Saginaw police to swab Griffin's saliva in order to compare his DNA to that of semen found inside the church.

In September, police found evidence of semen on the floor of Griffin's office and another room inside the synagogue.

On Thursday, police took the DNA sample from Griffin.

The Hoeller McLaughlin PLLC is representing Griffin.

"We believe strongly in the presumption of innocence, and we believe that it absolutely applies in this case," the firm said in a statement said. "Unfortunately, because it is a pending case, we cannot comment on the facts or circumstances surrounding the case at this time."

Tarrant County will open a coronavirus vaccine site in Saginaw on Tuesday in an effort to reach families from Southeast Asia and Latin America.

Vaccinations will be by appointment only. Tarrant County Public Health will contact individuals by phone and email. The site will open at 9 a.m. at the Saginaw Recreation Cen-

ter on 633 W. McLeroy Blvd.

This is the second site from the partnership between the county and UNT Health Science Center. Officials opened a site in Stop Six on March 23.


People can also register on the county's website or by calling 817-248-6299. All adults are eligible for the vaccine.

"The new site will offer people in Saginaw and surrounding communities a convenient and acces-

sible location to help protect themselves and their families through vaccination," said Dr. Sylvia Trent-Adams, HSC chief strategy officer, in a statement.

The site will serve people in Saginaw and surrounding areas such as Blue Mound. It will also help reach Southeast Asian families who resettled in Northwest Tarrant County after leaving countries such as Laos and Vietnam, officials said in a statement.

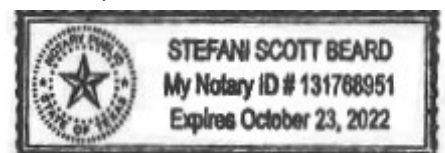

Arlington police look for information in shooting death

A man was shot and killed in the 4900 block of Long Beach Drive in Arlington on Saturday, according to police.

Police responded to the shooting at an apartment complex at 8:09 p.m. Saturday and found the 18-year-old man dead, according to a Sunday news release from Arlington police.

While officers were still on scene investigating, around 8:15 p.m., the Kennedale Police Department responded to a man who had been shot and drove to their city for help. Arlington officers also responded to that scene, which was in close proximity to the initial shooting scene at the apartment complex.

Investigators determined that the man who

had a gunshot wound in Kennedale was connected to the shooting on Long Beach Drive. He was taken to a local hospital and is expected to survive. A vehicle was seized at the Kennedale location for further processing.

Detectives believe that the man who died and the wounded man met up at the apartment complex for an unknown reason and fired multiple rounds at each other. The relation-

ship between the two men is unknown.

Investigators have not ruled out the possibility that other people may be involved.

Anyone with information related to this homicide investigation is asked to contact Arlington Detective Williams at 817-459-5312. Tipsters can also remain anonymous and contact Tarrant County Crime Stoppers at 817-469-TIPS.

The Tarrant County Medical Examiner's Office will identify the deceased once next of kin have been identified.

Before he could board flight, police arrest man accused of killing mother, sister

A 19-year-old man who killed his mother and sister in Allen was arrested on Saturday at DFW Airport as he was awaiting a flight to San Francisco, police said.

Hezar Burak killed Isil Borat, 50, and Burcu Hezar, 16, in the house they shared in the 1800 block of Nueces Drive, Allen police said. A police spokesman did not release the cause of the victims'

deaths.

Police received a call about 9:15 a.m. regarding a disturbance with weapons at the family's house. Officers arrived and found the victims' bodies.

Allen police investigators worked Saturday to find Burak, who was arrested on suspicion of two counts of murder Saturday afternoon at the airport.

Police did not describe a motive.

levels of ammonia. Her mind, at times, became fuzzy and unfocused.

But doctors had been reassuring that her damaged liver — the root of her problems — could heal itself over time, according to April and her mother, Camille Heileman, 58. They told her if she followed a healthy diet and lifestyle she could at the very least avoid a liver transplant until it became necessary down the road.

On March 31, sitting in a Baylor Scott & White hospital room, April learned that moment was sooner than she or her mother thought.

The doctor described how her liver was so damaged that she would need to get the proper insurance, which she didn't have, or come up with \$400,000 to pay for a transplant. If she couldn't do that, the doctor told her bluntly, she might be able to live for another three months.

Her family has found out the grand total is closer to half a million dollars, a mammoth figure they are trying to reach through a GoFundMe page. They haven't come close so far — the fundraiser has raised around \$9,600 as of Sunday.

Camille and her husband, who live in Wylie, as well as their son, who lives in Oklahoma, are prepared to step in and donate a liver to April when and if they can pull together the funds, and if it's determined they're a match. They won't be able to get tested, however, until they have the right insurance or the funds, Camille said. That's only one of their frustrations.

It feels to the family that there's a ticking clock hanging over their heads, with a deadline to meet that could mean life or death for someone they love.

It feels, to Camille, that her daughter's health isn't as important as money.

"Everybody's scared. It's like our hands are being tied at every turn that we make," she said. "Her health is being held for ransom."

The person at the center of all the concern, however, isn't throwing "a pity party," though there are days when it's hard for her to lift her head off the pillow, as April described to the Star-Telegram over the phone on Friday morning. She had woken up with her mouth full of blood, because her blood doesn't clot, she said. That led to nausea.

But by the time she got up and moving around, she was joking around with her roommate, whom she calls her "voice of reason." She knows her parents would rather have her back home, she acknowledged, but she doesn't want anyone waiting on her hand and foot, even now. She was working part-time at the White

Elephant Saloon in the Stockyards up until a couple weeks ago.

It was around that time she was diagnosed with cancer in the liver, on top of the cirrhosis of the liver she already knew she had. The organ damage has affected her health in sometimes mysterious ways — her skin, for instance, has taken on a yellow tone.

April said she doesn't want to hide, or to go through her days with people treating her differently. She doesn't want this to be her identity.

One of the hardest parts of these recent weeks has been seeing people feel afraid to talk to her, or unsure how to.

"I'm not a victim," April said. "My body isn't working correctly, and that's that."

'SO MUCH COULD HAVE BEEN PREVENTED'

Doctors at Baylor suggested it's possible April's liver damage could have something to do with a birth control shot she was getting in her arm, Camille said.

She began to receive the Depo-Provera contraceptive injection in college, an alternative to other birth control methods like pills that requires a patient to get a shot every three months. She kept coming back, over several months and then several years, for the shot, Camille said. Her doctor indicated it was fine to keep using the injection as an ongoing birth control method.

She and her mother have learned, however, this is in fact not recommended, and even unsafe.

The Food and Drug Administration states in its prescribing information for Depo-Provera that the injection shouldn't be used as a birth control method for more than two years, except in certain cases. The drug additionally isn't recommended for people with pre-existing liver problems, and among its rare and often severe side effects listed on WebMD are liver problems.

Camille, though she can't say for certain what happened, also believes April's antidepressants and anxiety medication could have contributed to her damaged liver. She has spoken with doctors who have cautioned about combining these drugs and a birth control shot. She has inspected pill bottles that list cancer as a side effect.

"There were some really big red flags that should have been looked at over the years," Camille said. "I feel like so much of this could have been prevented. So much could have been prevented."

Around two years ago, April was in seemingly fine health, trying to find steady work in Fort Worth. She had spent years as the personal as-

sistant to F. Howard Walsh Jr., the Fort Worth oilman and philanthropist who was a major TCU benefactor, until his death in June 2016. She had thought she might make a career at the company.

She worked in stints in retail stores and in restaurants, benefiting, Camille said, from a naturally outgoing personality and a strong work ethic. Outside of her jobs, she loved to fish, hunt and to ride horses at a ranch near Glen Rose.

Her life changed on June 15, 2019, when Camille couldn't get April on the phone in the afternoon and, with a "mother's intuition," drove to Fort Worth.

She had medics break into her apartment. The first thing she saw when she rushed inside was her daughter lying on the floor in a pool of blood.

"I thought somebody had murdered her," Camille said. "She sat up for a split second, and asked, 'What are you doing here?' and then she slipped into a coma."

The medical staff at John Peter Smith Hospital told Camille they had seen gunshot victims with blood counts as low as hers who didn't survive. The blood vessels in her esophagus had ruptured, meaning she needed bands put in to hold the vessels together. Doctors later determined she suffered a stroke.

About two weeks into her hospital stay, Camille remembers they were getting prepared to put a breathing tube into April's

throat. The family was saying their goodbyes, trying to come to terms with the fact she might not come out of the coma, when she popped up in bed, her eyes open.

She announced to the room, as Camille remembers, "What's going on?"

It was a moment that doctors swore they would have never believed if they hadn't been there, she said.

But it was only the beginning of April's problems.

She was feeling better when she was released in January 2020 so she took a trip to Spain, unaware

then, like the rest of the European country, COVID had been spreading. She contracted the virus, dealing with a dry cough and labored breathing, and passed it on to four family members. Other issues persisted too — the neuropathy that made her feet twitch, the uncontrollable swelling and bleeding.

As she continued to work in December 2020, she caught the coronavirus again. It put her in the hospital, and the staff at Baylor Scott & White noted her blood counts, platelet counts and ammonia levels were off.

April received then a version of what they had said before: Her liver is damaged and needs to heal, and medical events like this might happen.

Before Easter, she came back to the hospital and got the diagnosis that was like a 180-degree turn, that she might be able to live another three months without a new liver. She called her mom.

It was the first phone call she made, according to Camille.

That was more than two weeks ago.

"Now we're down to less than two months, and we're starting to see the effects," Camille said.

'THEY SAY TWO MONTHS; IT COULD BE 20 YEARS'

Camille has faith her family can somehow pull together the money to pay for a liver transplant, if she can get April's story out there. It could take one, or two, or even three people to see it, she said, to help the fundraiser gain the momentum it needs.

She hasn't allowed herself to think of losing her "baby girl," and has tried to come up with the money through whatever means necessary. She has called a long list of transplant centers and health clinics sent to her from friends, leaving desperate voicemails explaining the situation.

"I've never left so many voicemail messages with nothing in return," Ca-

mille said.

She feels abandoned, too, by family and friends who have been silent in the past weeks as the circumstances of her life have drastically changed. There's a lot for her to worry about on a given day, she said, especially not being able to see her daughter at all times.

But she understands why April doesn't want to be at home.

"She's not ready," Camille said. "She feels like if she comes back home, she's throwing in the towel."

April, her voice sounding tired over the phone but also laidback, said she thinks about her family and friends, and worries about how they're dealing with everything. She can feel their concern, which is an uncomfortable position for her to be in. She's always been the type of person to want to fix other people's problems.


When people approach her with too much seriousness, she will respond that everyone lives once, to have some fun. The way she sees it, "They say two months; it could be 20 years," she said.

Though she acknowledges it's frustrating to think about the situation she's in and how she got there, she said she's focusing on making sure those around her are smiling, and looking after herself. She hasn't been as worried about the GoFundMe as much as her mother, saying she doesn't want handouts. She would rather have a hug, she said, than a dollar.

She doesn't have a doctor's appointment until later this week. She was planning to ride horses on Saturday.

"What's the worst that can happen? I'll fall off," April said. "Which wouldn't happen, by the way, because I'm a really good horse rider."

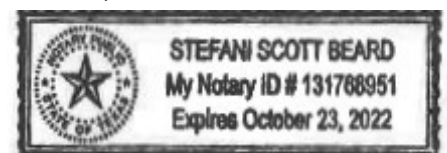

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VIENE DE LA PRIMERA

Los intentos de secuestro se han sumado ahora a la ola de violencia que sufren desde hace años los habitantes de Dallas y el Norte de Texas, a pesar de que esta ciudad ha cambiado de manera prácticamente rápida jefes de Policía en su intento por frenar los asesinatos, asaltos y otros crímenes. Incluso, este crecimiento de la inseguridad pública se ha sumado a los altos índices de violencia familiar en los que el mal trato a menores de edad y mujeres se ha vuelto la información destacada de todos los días a través de los medios de comunicación y representantes comunitarios. Este exceso del crimen, el desempleo y la crisis económica causada por la pandemia del Coronavirus ha llevado a consumir asesinatos y suicidos dentro del mismo seno familiar, sin que se vea a corto plazo alguna manera de detenerlos ni mucho menos de reducir sus altos niveles que registran diariamente las diversas corporaciones policiales. Debido a esta grave situación, el Departamento de Policía de Fort Worth ha ofrecido una alta suma de dinero a todos aquellos interesados en presentar un plan que sea efectivo para reducir la delincuencia que poco a poco se ha ido adueñando de esa vecina ciudad.

ASESINA A SUS HIJAS

Entre esta ola de violencia se suma el de una mujer de 30 años que fue arrestada por la muerte de sus hijas pequeñas después de que llamó al 911 y le declaró a la Policía que había matado a sus hijas, informó un vocero de la corporación. Madison McDonald condujo hasta el Departamento de Policía de Irving alrededor de las 10 pm y usó el teléfono en el vestíbulo para llamar al 911, señaló el portavoz. La presunta criminal indicó a los despachadores que había matado a sus dos hijas, Lillian Mae McDonald, de 1 año, y Archer Hammond, de 6 años. Los oficiales respondieron en el vestíbulo para arrestar a McDonald en su casa, ubicada en la cuadra 700 de Cowboys Parkway, dijo la Policía. Los oficiales que respondieron a la casa confirmaron que ambas hijas estaban muertas. La Policía no dijo cómo murieron las menores ni si hubo un motivo. McDonald enfrenta dos cargos de homicidio capital de personas menores de 10 años, informó la Policía. Está detenida en la cárcel de Irving sin derecho a fianza. La investigación continúa. MASIVO ASESINATO

Seis personas fueron encontradas muertas en una casa de Allen en lo que la Policía cree es un aparente asesinato-suicidio. Los oficiales se dirigieron alrededor de la una de la

mañana a la cuadra 1500 de Pine Bluff Drive después de que un amigo de la familia informara que alguien en la casa tenía tendencias suicidas, dijo la Policía. Cuando llegaron los oficiales, encontraron a una familia de seis muertos dentro de la casa. Fueron identificados como Altafun Nessa, 77, Iren Islam, 56, Towhidul Islam, 54, Tanvir Towhid, 21, y Farbin Towhid y Farhan Towhid, ambos 19. La Policía informó que eran dos hermanos, una hermana, su padre y su madre, y una abuela. La institución policial señaló que cree que los hermanos mataron a sus familiares y luego a ellos mismos. “Al parecer, dos hermanos llegaron a un acuerdo para suicidarse y terminaron llevándose a toda la familia con ellos”, dijo el sargento Jon Felty, portavoz de la institución. Una cuenta de redes sociales que pertenecía a Farhan Towhid contenía un enlace a una larga carta que presagiaba los asesinatos. La Policía informó a noticias del canal KXAS-TV (NBC5) que uno de los hermanos compró recientemente un arma.

LOS HECHOS

Shawn Ahsan se reunió cerca de la casa con varios miembros de la Asociación de Bangladesh del Norte de Texas durante la mayor parte de la tarde del lunes. Ahsan dijo que conocía a la familia desde hacía unos 11 años y era cercano a Towhidul Islam. “Estaba orgulloso” de sus tres hijos, dijo Ahsan. Ahsan expresó que intentó llamar al Islam el domingo y se preocupó un poco cuando no recibió respuesta. Escuchó la noticia de las muertes de un amigo el lunes por la mañana. “Dije, 'debes estar bromeando’”. "No pude respirar durante 20 minutos, para ser honesto contigo, estaba llorando en mi oficina". Ahmad Hossain, que vive a una cuadra de distancia, dijo que la familia era originaria de Nueva York, pero que se mudó al vecindario hace siete u ocho años. Hossain dijo que Nessa vivía en Bangladesh y estaba visitando a la familia. Tenía programado regresar a casa la semana pasada, pero no pudo viajar debido al COVID-19. "Es triste lo que le pasó a ella, si se hubiera ido, ella [habría sobrevivido]", dijo. Sahnewaz Hossain, la esposa de Ahmad Hossain, dijo que conoció bien a Iren Islam a través de una clase religiosa.

BUENA FAMILIA

“La mamá siempre hablaba de los niños, de lo buenos que son en los estudios, de cómo están entrando en buenas escuelas con becas”, dijo. “Cada vez que volvía a casa, les decía a mis hijos lo bien que les estaba yendo. Eran una familia sencilla y divertida". Hossain dijo que a Iren Islam y sus amigos les gustaba plantar vegetales y que hace unos días alguien le había pedido algunas semillas. La mujer no tenía ninguno, pero hizo todo lo posible para encontrar algunos para su

amiga. Cuando la amiga vino por las semillas, Islam había preparado varios platos para enviar a casa con ella. “Su familia era así. Compartieron con todos”, indicó. Fazia Rahman y Angelina Biswas se graduaron de Allen High School el año pasado con Farbin y Farhan Towhid. "Sus padres eran realmente las personas más agradables que he conocido en mi vida", dijo Rahman. “Tan amable, cariñoso... Trataban a todos como si fueran sus propios hijos, decían 'Pasen, tenemos comida para ustedes, vengan a comer'". Ambos dijeron que Farbin Towhid era una persona dulce y extrovertida.

"[Ella] estaba tan burbujeante", dijo Biswas. "Hablar con ella era como una bombilla que se apagaba todo el tiempo". Biswas dijo que Farhan Towhid era una persona brillante y ambiciosa. "Le gustaba mucho la programación y la codificación, y solo aprendió por el bien de sí mismo", dijo. “Siempre hacía proyectos y cosas que le gustaban mucho para poder saber más... Era bueno en muchas cosas, pero era súper modesto y humilde al respecto". Rahman dijo que quería que la gente supiera que la familia era más que lo que les había pasado. “No queremos que este sea su legado familiar”, dijo. “Eran personas tan maravillosas que realmente tocaron la vida de todos con quienes entraron en contacto... Eran buenas personas que tenían un futuro brillante por delante". Karen Falla, que vive al otro lado de la calle, dijo que ella y su familia aún están procesando lo sucedido.

"Estábamos trabajando en nuestro jardín ayer y las seis personas ya habían muerto, y no teníamos ni idea", dijo. Falla dijo que su familia no conocía muy bien a la familia, pero que su esposo charlaba con ellos cuando estaban trabajando en el jardín. Su hija conocía a dos de los hermanos, dijo. “Dijo que son niños inteligentes”, dijo Falla. "La hermana era muy dulce, son niños inteligentes y les fue bien en la escuela y tenían una perspectiva positiva para su futuro". La Policía continúa investigando las muertes. ARRESTAN A SECUESTRADOR

Un hombre fue arrestado en relación con varios intentos de secuestro durante el fin de semana en el condado de Denton, indicaron las autoridades. La Policía de Corinth dijo que un hombre trató de atraer a una mujer a su vehículo poco después de las 12:30 pm en Lake Sharon Drive entre FM2499 y Oakmont Drive. El sospechoso vestía una sudadera con capucha, gafas de sol y una máscara médica, dijo la Policía. No le mostró un arma a la mujer. El Departamento encargado del orden compartió una foto del vehículo del sospechoso y le pidió a cualquiera que lo hubiera visto que llamara al 911.

DELITO EN ESCUELA

Un empleado de Garland ISD está de licencia administrativa después de supuestamente tomar fotos de una estudiante de escuela primaria mientras estaba en el baño. Según los informes, el incidente tuvo lugar durante la semana del 29 de marzo en la escuela primaria Abbett, según un correo electrónico enviado a los padres el jueves 1 de abril. La directora de Abbett, Kelly Williams, dijo en el correo electrónico que la Policía está

investigando el incidente y que las familias afectadas han sido notificadas. "Para mantener la integridad de la investigación y proteger la privacidad de los estudiantes, el Departamento de Policía de Garland llevará a cabo la investigación", dijo Williams. Rachel Blakemore, madre de un estudiante de Abbett, dijo que cuando recibió el correo electrónico por primera vez, asumió que era una notificación de un caso de COVID-19 reportado dentro de la escuela. "Mi corazón dio un vuelco cuando leí el contenido del correo electrónico", dijo. "Como madre y esposa de un trabajador social empleado por CPS, me alegra que el distrito esté tomando medidas, pero me gustaría tener algunas respuestas sobre el alcance y la gravedad de este incidente". La portavoz del distrito, Caren Rodríguez, dijo que no tenían más información ni una actualización sobre el incidente. El distrito no dio a conocer el nombre del maestro y la Policía no respondió a una solicitud de comentarios. “La seguridad y protección de nuestros estudiantes es siempre una prioridad en Garland ISD”, dijo Williams en el correo electrónico a los padres. "Nos mantendremos alerta para mantener un entorno seguro y protegido todos los días".



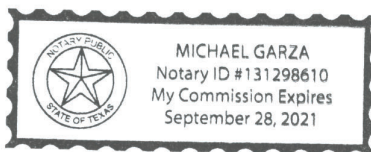

Con 56 candidatos comenzó la lucha por el Concilio de Dallas

Concluye la elección anticipada el próximo el 27 de abril

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VIENE DE LA PRIMERA

La votación anticipada comenzó este pasado lunes para las elecciones del 1 de mayo, que han atraído a decenas de candidatos que se postulan para el Concejo Municipal de Dallas y una gran cantidad de oficinas de alcaldes suburbanos.

También está en la boleta una elección especial para llenar un escaño en el Congreso.

Las elecciones al Concejo Municipal de Dallas tienen 56 candidatos compitiendo por 14 escaños. El alcalde Eric Johnson, elegido en junio de 2019, tiene un mandato de cuatro años y no está en la boleta electoral. Los mandatos del Ayuntamiento son de dos años.

Tres de los 14 miembros del Concilio han alcanzado el límite de cuatro mandatos consecutivos, dejando a 11 miembros del consejo buscando la reelección. Con tantos candidatos, es prácticamente seguro que el condado de Dallas celebrará una segunda vuelta. Para ganar por completo, un candidato debe recibir el 50% de los votos más uno. Si nadie alcanza ese umbral, los dos primeros clasificados competirán en una segunda vuelta el 5 de junio.

La junta de fideicomisarios del Distrito Escolar Independiente de Dallas (DISD) tiene solo un puesto en disputa.

Esto es lo que necesita saber antes de ir a las urnas:
¿Cuándo puedo votar?

La votación anticipada continuará hasta el 27 de abril.
Las horas de votación anticipada en el condado de Dallas son:

19-24 de abril: 8 am. a 5 pm.

25 de abril: 13h a 18h

26-27 de abril: 7 am. a 7 p.m.

Las horas de votación anticipada en el condado de Collin son:

19-24 de abril: 8 am a 5 pm

Las horas de votación anticipada en el condado de Tarrant son:

19-23 de abril: 8 am a 5 pm.

24 de abril: de 7 am. a 7 pm.

25 de abril: de 11:00 am a 16:00 pm.

26-27 de abril: 7 am. a 7 pm.

El 1 de mayo, día de las elecciones, las urnas se abrirán a las 7 am y cerrarán a las 7 pm. Podrán votar si están en línea antes de las 7 pm.

¿Dónde voto? Cada condado enumera sus sitios de votación anticipada en su sitio web. Los condados de Dallas, Collin y Tarrant se han trasladado a centros de votación en todo el condado. Eso significa que el día de las elecciones los votantes pueden emitir su voto en cualquiera de los lugares de votación abiertos del condado, lo que aumenta la flexibilidad y conveniencia de los votantes. En el condado de Dallas, los votantes pueden emitir su voto en cualquiera de los centros de votación del condado que figuran en el sitio web de elecciones del condado. Los votantes no están vinculados a una ubicación de distrito. El sitio web de elecciones del condado de Dallas rastrea qué lugares de votación tienen largas filas y qué filas se mueven más rápidamente.
¿Cómo sé si soy elegible para votar? Para ser elegible para votar en las elecciones de mayo, debe haberse registrado antes del 1 de abril. Puede verificar su registro de votante con el administrador de elecciones de su condado (Dallas-CountyVotes.org para Dallas) o en el sitio web del secretario de estado [www.votetexas.gov](#).

Si aún no está registrado para votar, aún puede registrarse a tiempo para la segunda vuelta. Debe registrarse antes del 5 de mayo para votar en las elecciones de desempate del 5 de junio.

¿Es necesario que mi dirección en

mi licencia de conducir y el registro de votante coincidan?

No. El estado no requiere que la dirección de su licencia de conducir coincida con su tarjeta de registro de votante.

Si bien siempre es bueno tener su licencia actualizada, la Ley de Identificación de Votantes del estado permite a los electores emitir su voto con una licencia que ha estado vencida por hasta cuatro años. Los votantes mayores de 70 años pueden usar cualquier licencia vencida.

¿Qué tipos de documentación puedo utilizar para cumplir con las reglas de identificación de votantes del estado?

Debe proporcionar uno de los siete siguientes tipos de identificación con foto:

Licencia de conducir de Texas

Certificado de identificación electoral de Texas

Tarjeta de identificación personal de Texas
Licencia de arma de fuego de Texas
Certificado de ciudadanía estadounidense con foto.
Tarjeta de identificación militar de EU, con foto
Pasaporte estadounidense
Si no puede razonablemente obtener uno de estos, aún puede emitir su voto firmando una Declaración de Impedimento Razonable y proporcionando uno de los siguientes documentos:

Certificado de nacimiento

Factura de servicios públicos actual
-Extracto de cuenta bancaria
-Cheque del gobierno
-Cheque de pago
-Dirección del gobierno con su nombre y dirección, incluido su certificado de registro de votante

¿Cómo puedo votar por correo?
El 20 de abril fue el último día para solicitar una boleta por correo para las elecciones de mayo. La solicitud debe recibirse, no solo con matasellos, antes de esa fecha. Las boletas electorales por correo deben recibirse antes de las 7 pm del 1 de mayo. Texas no tiene votación por correo "sin excusa". La Corte Suprema de Texas ha dicho que la falta de inmunidad al COVID-19 por sí sola no califica a una persona para votar por correo. Los electores deben tener otra condición física que les impida acudir a las urnas por riesgo para su salud. Pero el tribunal no ha especificado cuáles son esas condiciones. Ha dejado esa determinación en manos de los votantes, que corren el riesgo de violar la ley estatal. Para calificar para votar por correo, los tejanos deben estar bajo uno de estos cuatro requisitos. Tener 65 años o más. Planee estar fuera de su condado de residencia durante la elección (esto incluirá a miembros del Ejército, estudiantes universitarios y aquellos estacionados en el extranjero para trabajar.

Tiene una discapacidad.
Estar confinado en la cárcel sin haber sido finalmente condenado por un delito grave. Solicite una boleta por correo pero no la he recibido. ¿Cual es el trato? Texas comienza a enviar boletas por correo a partir de 45 días antes de una elección. Ese umbral de 45 días fue el 17 de marzo. Si ha presentado una solicitud y aún no tiene su boleta, debe comunicarse con su administrador electoral local. Los expertos instan a los votantes que no reciban sus boletas por correo al menos tres días antes de la elección a cancelarlas y votar en persona. Para hacerlo, los votantes que no recibieran sus boletas por correo deberán dar fe de que no las recibieron. Esto se puede hacer por correo tres días antes de la elección o en persona después de que haya transcurrido ese plazo. Luego, se les permitirá emitir una boleta provisional, que se contará siempre que no se reciba una boleta por correo para ese votante. Recibí una boleta por correo, pero ahora quiero votar en persona. ¿Cómo puedo hacer eso?

Si decide esperar hasta el día de las elecciones para devolver su boleta por correo, aún puede emitirla devolviéndola en persona a su secretario de votación anticipada el 1 de mayo antes de las 7 pm. Si desea emitir su boleta en un lugar de votación, tendrá que llevar su boleta por correo para que puedan cancelarla. Cancelar su boleta por correo es la única forma en que le permitirán votar en persona. Pero deberías poder hacer todo eso al mismo tiempo. No olvide llevar una forma aprobada de identificación con foto para verificar quién es usted. Algunos votantes de Dallas que emitieron boletas por correo en las elecciones presidenciales desconfían de la votación por correo porque sus boletas no llegaron a la oficina de elecciones a tiempo para ser contadas. Si le preocupa esto para las elecciones de mayo, la oficina electoral del condado de Dallas proporciona una lista de las boletas electorales por correo que recibe cada día, o puede llamar a la oficina al 469-627-8683 para verificar el estado de su boleta.

Según la ley estatal, todos los secretarios de votación anticipada deben mantener un registro diario de las boletas emitidas en cada uno de sus lugares de votación y publicar esa lista en su sitio web. Entonces, si vive fuera del condado de Dallas, puede llamar a la oficina del administrador de elecciones y verificar si ha recibido su boleta por correo.
¿Hay varios lugares para entregar una boleta en Texas? No, el código electoral de Texas no los permite. Pero si solicitó una boleta por correo y califica, puede entregar sus boletas en persona en la oficina del secretario de votación anticipada de su condado durante la votación anticipada y el día de las elecciones. Aún deberá proporcionar una identificación con foto. Durante la elección presidencial, a los votantes se les permitió dejar su boleta en el estacionamiento del sitio. Esto ya no se permitirá ya que los procedimientos de entrega han vuelto a la normalidad. Los votantes deberán llevar sus boletas dentro del edificio.

¿Qué pasa si asisto a una universidad fuera del estado pero resido en Texas y quiero votar? Solicite una boleta electoral por correo antes del 20 de abril. No es necesario que incluya prueba de residencia, solo debe proporcionar su dirección residencial en la solicitud.
¿Está disponible la votación en la acera?

Si. La votación en la acera debe estar disponible en todos los lugares de votación para los votantes que no puedan físicamente ingresar a un lugar de votación sin asistencia personal o que tengan la posibilidad de dañar su salud.

Si tiene un asistente de votación con usted, ellos pueden notificar a un funcionario electoral dentro del lugar de votación que está solicitando una votación en la acera. En el condado de Dallas, puede llamar al 214-819-6338 para informar a los funcionarios electorales que necesitará votar en la acera.

Los funcionarios electorales verificarán que cumpla con los requisitos para votar en la acera y luego le traerán todo lo que necesita para emitir su voto. Una vez que complete su boleta, el funcionario electoral la devuelve al interior para emitirla como cualquier otro voto.
¿Tengo que usar una máscara para votar?

No se requiere que los votantes usen máscaras, pero se les anima a que lo hagan. Los funcionarios electorales que ayudan a los votantes que están votando en la acera deben usar cubiertas para la cara, al igual que cualquier persona que esté ayudando al votante en la acera.

RESPALDO DE JOHNSON

Por segunda vez en tantas semanas, el alcalde de Dallas, Eric Johnson, ha respaldado a otro retador en lugar de un titular del Concejo Municipal en un intento por ganar más aliados en el cuerpo gobernante. Donald Parish, quien busca representar al Distrito 7 en el sur de Dallas, anunció el que el alcalde lo respalda en la carrera de ocho personas que incluye al titular Adam Bazaldúa. Parish calificó el respaldo del alcalde como "una verdadera bendición" y dijo que

apreciaba el apoyo. El respaldo sigue un patrón de aprobación aparente que el alcalde del primer mandato le ha dado a tres candidatos que buscan desbancar a los titulares que representan a los distritos en la parte este de la ciudad, incluido el lugar donde vive Johnson. Johnson respaldó públicamente la semana pasada a Yolanda Faye Williams para representar al Distrito 5 del sureste de Dallas en su quinta candidatura para el Concejo Municipal. Una captura de pantalla de un volante publicado por la candidata del Distrito 5 del Concejo Municipal de Dallas, Yolanda Faye Williams, el 15 de abril de 2021 muestra un respaldo del alcalde Eric Johnson.

RECORTE POLÉMICO

Su apoyo a los dos retadores hasta ahora se produce después de que el Alcalde en repetidas ocasiones hizo una distinción entre él y la mayoría de los miembros del Consejo que votaron para recortar \$ 7 millones en el presupuesto de horas extras de la Policía. El dinero se reinvertió en iniciativas diseñadas para poner más oficiales en servicio de patrulla y otros planes relacionados con la seguridad pública.

Johnson, uno de los cuatro votos en contra del recorte, ha equiparado la reducción del presupuesto de horas extras como "quitar fondos" al Departamento de Policía y obstaculizar la forma en que la agencia de aplicación de la ley aborda los delitos más violentos de la ciudad. Bazaldúa, Jaime Resendez (Distrito 5); y Paula Blackmon (Distrito 9) estuvieron entre los 11 votos a favor de la reasignación presupuestaria después de que Bazaldúa presentara la idea. La seguridad pública es el tema principal en las elecciones del 1 de mayo.

En su declaración de respaldo, Johnson llamó a Parish, pastor y fundador de una organización sin fines de lucro, el "tipo de líder" que

los residentes del sur de Dallas necesitan en el Ayuntamiento.

“Él realmente se preocupa por la gente del Distrito 7 y es alguien que está comprometido a trabajar con nuestro Departamento de Policía, no en contra de él, para hacer que nuestros vecindarios sean más seguros”, dijo Johnson.

Bazaldúa, quien dijo que tiene el respaldo en la carrera por el Distrito 7 de los exalcaldes Mike Rawlings y Ron Kirk, dijo que pensaba que era "desafortunado ver al alcalde usar este tiempo e influencia para servirse a sí mismo".

“Nuestra ciudad se encuentra actualmente en medio de muchos tiempos desafiantes que deberían ser el foco de toda su energía”, dijo Bazaldúa. "Espero que los contribuyentes vean lo que realmente consume el tiempo y la energía del Alcalde de Dallas en este momento, que es la política y el drama".

Varios de los donantes anteriores del alcalde han donado a Williams, Parish y John Botefuhr, quien se postula para el escaño del Distrito 9 en East Dallas contra Blackmon. Johnson vive en ese distrito y no ha anunciado un respaldo oficial de nadie en esa carrera.

Williams, Parish y Botefuhr dijeron a The News que se habrían opuesto al recorte presupuestario de horas extras.

CUESTIONES RACIALES

El apoyo del Alcalde a los oponentes también ha generado críticas porque los tres titulares son de ascendencia latina y sus pérdidas llevarían a una menor representación cultural en una ciudad donde el 42% de los residentes son latinos, la más grande de todas las razas en Dallas. Los cargos de Alcalde y ocho del concejo municipal están ocupados actualmente por personas de color, y cinco de ellos son latinos. El alcalde provisional Adam Medrano no es elegible para postularse este año después de cumplir cuatro mandatos consecutivos. Omar Narváez busca un tercer mandato en representación del Distrito 6 en West Dallas.

Los retadores Williams y Parish son afroamericanos y Botefuhr es blanco.

Bazaldúa es la primera persona latina en representar al Distrito 7, que es predominantemente afroestadunidense, desde que se redistribuyó a principios de los 90.

REACCION DE D. GARCIA

Domingo García, presidente nacional de la Liga de Ciudadanos Latinoamericanos Unidos, calificó de "divisivo" apuntar a los tres titulares, que fueron electos en 2019, y creía que podría haber una posible reacción violenta contra el alcalde si busca un segundo mandato en 2023.

“Es común que los alcaldes y los concejales tengan diferencias de opinión sobre temas políticos, pero nunca se convirtió en algo personal o en una pelea política de barrio como la que estamos viendo participar al alcalde”, dijo García, exmiembro del Concejo Municipal de Dallas.

Bazaldúa dijo que no sentía que él y sus colegas del consejo estuvieran siendo señalados por su herencia.

"Creo que estamos siendo atacados por nuestra fuerza y [Johnson] sabe que no seremos el eslabón más débil y que simplemente nos alinearemos con lo que él quiere", dijo Bazaldúa. "Todos sabemos que nuestro alcalde ha tenido grandes dificultades para contar hasta ocho". La frase es una referencia al número de votos necesarios para una mayoría en el Ayuntamiento.

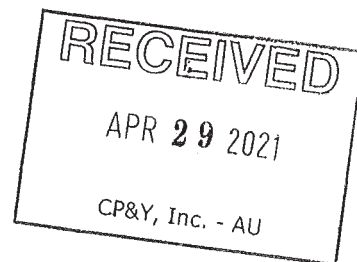

Department Policies Affecting Bicycle Use on the State Highway System

In accordance with Texas Administrative Code, Title 43, Part 1, Chapter 25, Subchapter D, Rule §25.55 (a) and (b), the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Fort Worth District is partnering with the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) to offer a virtual public hearing on district transportation projects, programs, and policies affecting bicycle use on the state highway system. The virtual public hearing will begin on Thursday, May 6, 2021 at 4 p.m. This is not a live event and the materials and presentations can be viewed any time beginning Thursday, May 6 at 4 p.m. through Friday, May 21, 2021 at 11:59 p.m. To log into the virtual public hearing, go to www.keepitmovingdallas.com/bicycle. Pre-recorded video presentations will include both audio and visual components. Additional materials, including written transcripts of the presentations, exhibits and supporting documents will also be available. The purpose of the hearing is to provide information on transportation projects that might affect bicycle use, plans, policies, and programs for the TxDOT Fort Worth District and NCTCOG and to receive public comments. Fort Worth District Bicycle Program

Bicycling is an inexpensive and efficient form of transportation. Riding a bicycle may help reduce traffic congestion and improve air quality within our community. Bicycling can also improve your health and well-being through regular exercise. Every transportation agency, including TxDOT, has the responsibility to improve conditions and opportunities for bicycling and to integrate bicycling into our transportation systems.

It is TxDOT's policy to consider bicyclists in the development of transportation projects, as part of design, construction and maintenance of state roadways and in the development of federally funded transportation projects. Bicycles are considered to be vehicles and bicyclists are required to adhere to the rules of the road.

The TxDOT Fort Worth District works with local entities, such as cities and counties, to identify bicycle and pedestrian connectivity projects, and to implement and improve safety and connectivity between current and planned regional transportation networks. The planning and development process is typically guided by standards and guidelines based on leading practices and feasibility for developing bicycling and walking facilities. For information on project requirements for Bicycle and Pedestrian Accommodation, click [here](#).

TxDOT involves the general public on bicycle-related matters through public involvement and its Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC).

Public Involvement generally includes Public Meetings, Public Hearings, and Notices providing opportunities for public comment. These activities are generally handled at the TxDOT District level on a reoccurring basis in accordance with Texas Administrative Code - Title 43, Part 1, Chapter 25, Subchapter D, Rule § 25.55 (b).

In the consideration of pedestrian and bicycle accommodations, public input (when applicable) as well as bicycle and pedestrian accommodation plans produced by city, county, and metropolitan planning organizations shall be considered. Local bicycle and pedestrian interest groups can also be contacted for public input.

TxDOT's BAC is an 11-member committee approved by the Texas Transportation Commission. Members are selected to serve a 3-year term (September 1 through August 31). TxDOT makes an announcement annually to its 25 District Bicycle Coordinators to seek new BAC members. TxDOT and the Commission strive for a committee that is geographically balanced and professionally diverse, as well as knowledgeable about bicycle accommodations and about transportation and transportation funding. TxDOT has a Statewide Bicycle Coordinator and designated District Bicycle Coordinators in each of its 25 districts that serve as a local point of contact on bicycle-related issues. In addition, large Metropolitan Planning Organizations, like the North Central Texas Council of Governments, have staff to support the consideration of bicyclists as part of regional transportation planning.

Cooper Street has no bike lane facilities despite its high potential in connectivity to the rest of the city. Cooper street has been an incredibly dangerous area for cyclists and pedestrians as cars will often speed and the street expands up to 8 lanes. There have been many pedestrian and cyclist deaths along Cooper street. 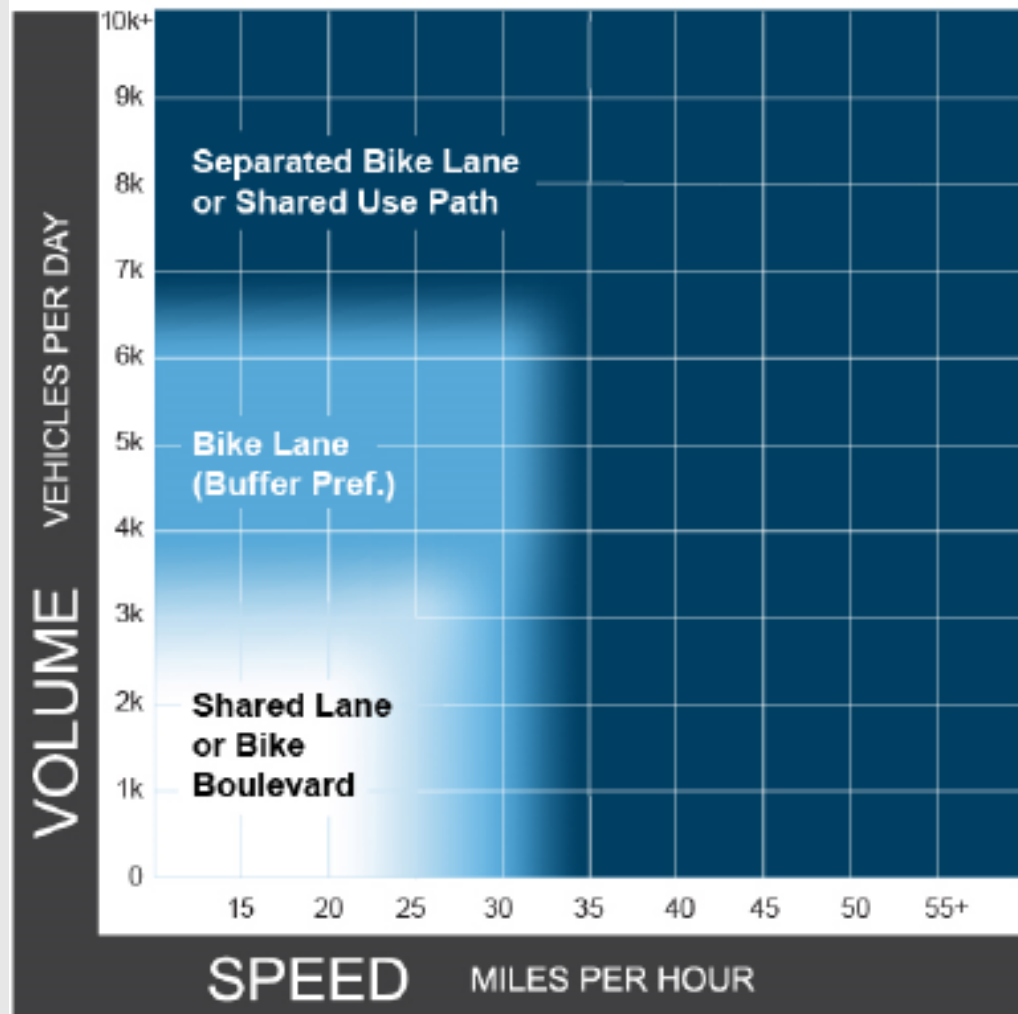

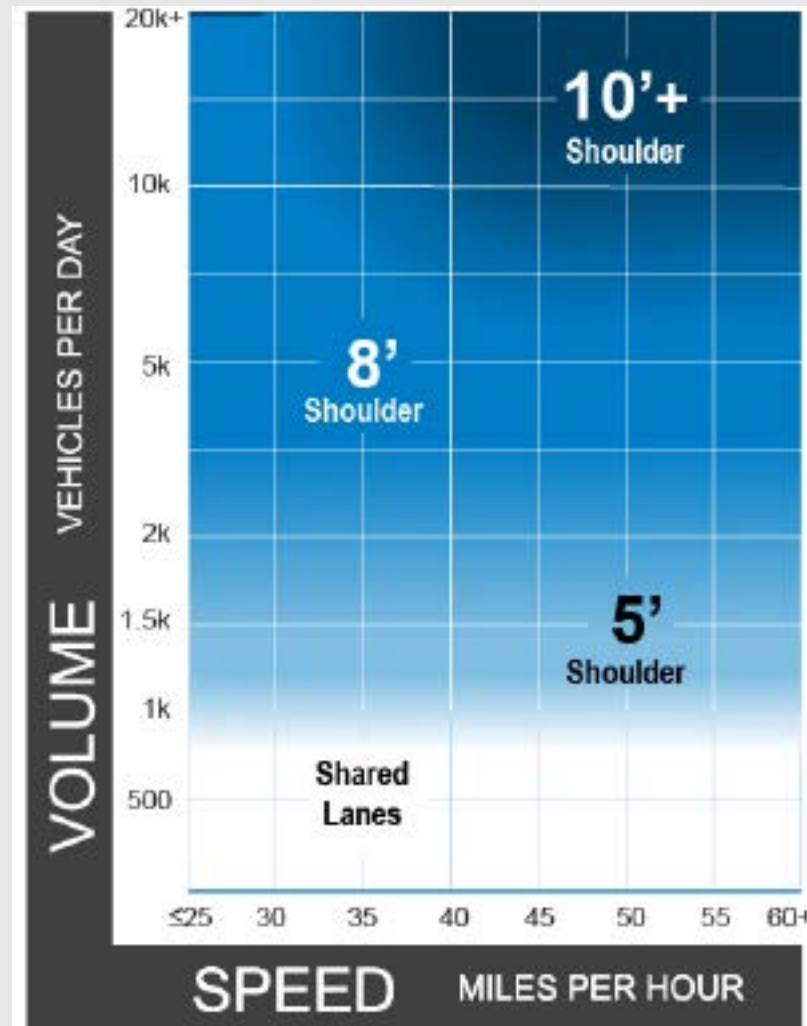

SLIDE 1 - Introduction Slide

Welcome to the virtual public hearing for the Bicycle Use on the State Highway System presented by the Texas Department of Transportation, Fort Worth District. We appreciate your interest in this program and welcome each of you.

Please note that this presentation can be paused at any point to allow you more time to review the slides.

SLIDE 2 - Virtual Public Hearing in Response to Public Health

Due to the COVID-19 outbreak, along with our commitment to protecting public health, TxDOT is conducting this virtual public hearing to minimize in-person contact.

This presentation will cover the same information that the Fort Worth District would have shared at a live hearing. However, the comment process will be different and that will be explained shortly. All project information and supplemental materials can be found on the project website.

SLIDE 3 - Public Hearing Purpose

The purpose of this public hearing is to provide information on transportation projects that might affect bicycle use, plans, policies, and programs for the TxDOT Fort Worth District and NCTCOG, and to receive public comment, as well as provide a general overview of the guidelines the TxDOT Fort Worth District follows when identifying the need for bicycle facilities along a state highway.

SLIDE 4 – Texas Administrative Code/Federal Highways Administration

Requirements

This public hearing is being held in compliance with both federal and state laws, which are listed on this slide. Following the end of the public comment period that ends May 21, 2021, the Department will proceed with the preparation of the final public hearing summary report. Your statements and comments will be addressed in this documentation and will be given full consideration in moving forward in developing, planning and programming of our bicycle projects. The public hearing summary report and comment response form will be posted to the Fort Worth Bicycle Program website once they are prepared.

SLIDE 5 – Planning and Designing Bicycle Facilities

Connectivity is an important aspect of the planning, development, and construction of effective bicycle routes. The District works with NCTCOG and local entities, such as cities and counties, to identify bicycle and pedestrian projects that improve safety and connectivity between current and planned regional transportation networks.

TxDOT relies on guidelines and standards that are outlined in the TxDOT Roadway Design Manual, the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (or AASHTO) bicycle and pedestrian design guides, and the Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices as the primary resources for planning, designing and operating bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

The National Association of City Transportation Officials (or NACTO) Urban Bikeway Design Guide builds upon the flexibilities provided in the AASHTO guidelines to provide additional recommendations to help communities plan and design safe and convenient accommodations for pedestrian and bicyclists. FHWA supports the use of these resources to further develop non-motorized transportation networks, particularly in urban areas.

SLIDE 6 – TxDOT’s Policy – Urban, Urban Core, Suburban, and Rural Towns

TxDOT also recently updated its design guidelines, which it released in an April 2021 memo entitled “Bicycle Accommodation Design Guidance.” This memo outlines guidelines for bicycle and pedestrian accommodations to be taken into consideration during transportation project planning moving forward.

As stated in the memo, for all types of projects within an urban, urban core, suburban, and rural town setting, TxDOT will provide the recommended bicycle accommodations based on traffic volumes and posted speed limits, as determined by the graph shown on the next slide. Pedestrian accommodations

would be designed to meet Texas Accessibility Standards and Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines requirements.

Bicycle accommodations for bridge projects would include a minimum 5-foot clear space from the adjacent motor vehicle travel lane, with additional separation for roadways identified on the Texas Bicycle Tourism Trails Example Network.

SLIDE 7 – TxDOT’s Policy – Urban, Urban Core, Suburban, and Rural Towns

This slide shows a graph depicting how the recommended bicycle facility is selected for the urban, urban core, suburban, and rural town context. As you can see, the recommended accommodation includes additional separation between motorists and bicyclists as traffic volumes and speeds increase.

SLIDE 8 – TxDOT’s Policy – Rural Areas (Excludes Rural Towns)

For projects within rural areas, excluding rural towns, where project scoping or environmental studies indicate the need for bicycle accommodations, TxDOT will provide the recommended bicycle accommodations based on traffic volumes and posted speed limits, as determined by the graph shown on the next slide. In some cases, including for roadways indicated in TxDOT’s Bicycle Tourism Trails Study, an 8-foot wide shoulder, shared use path or other locally preferred facility type may be provided.

Bridge projects in rural areas would include the same facilities provided in urban areas.

SLIDE 9 – TxDOT’s Policy – Rural Areas (Excludes Rural Towns)

This slide shows a graph depicting how the recommended bicycle facility is selected for rural areas, excluding rural towns. As shown, shared lanes are recommended for roadways with low speed and low traffic volumes. As speed and traffic volumes increase, increased shoulder widths are proposed to accommodate bicyclists.

SLIDE 10 – Bicycle Accommodation Information

To learn more about TxDOT’s Bicycle and Pedestrian program, please visit the website shown on this slide. This website provides information on the planning and design, funding opportunities, and various other resources about bicycle and pedestrian accommodations and safety, as required by U.S. Department of Transportation and TxDOT policy.

SLIDE 11 – I-35W at BUS 35W

The next few slides show the Fort Worth District projects included in this public hearing. Please note that plans for these projects may be subject to change since they are still being designed.

The I-35 West at Business 35 West project is located on the northwest side of Alvarado in Johnson County. This project would include approximately 1.2 miles

of sidewalks, shared use paths, and 5-foot wide shoulders between County Road 604 and County Road 707 to U.S. Highway 67.

The I-35 West at Business 35 West project costs approximately \$10.4 million and uses federal and state funding sources. The project is anticipated to let in 2021 and be complete in 2023.

SLIDE 12 – I-30

The I-30 project is located in west Fort Worth in Tarrant County. This project would include approximately 3.3 miles of shared use paths between Linkcrest Drive and I-820.

The I-30 project costs approximately \$125 million and uses federal and state funding sources. The project is anticipated to let in 2024 and be complete in 2025.

SLIDE 13 – FM 1810

The FM 1810 project is located in northwest Decatur in Wise County. This project would include approximately 4.1 miles of sidewalks and shared use paths between west of County Road 1170 and US 81.

The FM 1810 project costs approximately \$52.5 million and uses federal and state funding sources. The project is anticipated to let in 2024 and be complete in 2027.

SLIDE 14 – FM 157

The FM 157 project is located on the south side of Venus in Johnson County. This project would include approximately 0.4 mile of sidewalks and shared use paths between 8th Street and north of County Road 108B.

The FM 157 project costs approximately \$6.6 million and uses state funding. The project is anticipated to let in 2024 and be complete in 2027.

SLIDE 15 – SH 183

The SH 183 project is located in west Fort Worth in Tarrant County. This project would include approximately 5 miles of sidewalks and shared use paths between I-30 and SH 199.

The SH 183 project costs approximately \$76.5 million and uses federal and state funding sources. The project letting and completion dates have yet to be determined.

SLIDE 16 – Fort Worth District Staff

This slide identifies the personnel with the Fort Worth District whose responsibilities include ensuring successful planning, development, and constructions of these bicycle and pedestrian facilities.

Metropolitan Planning Organization for the Dallas-Fort Worth Region



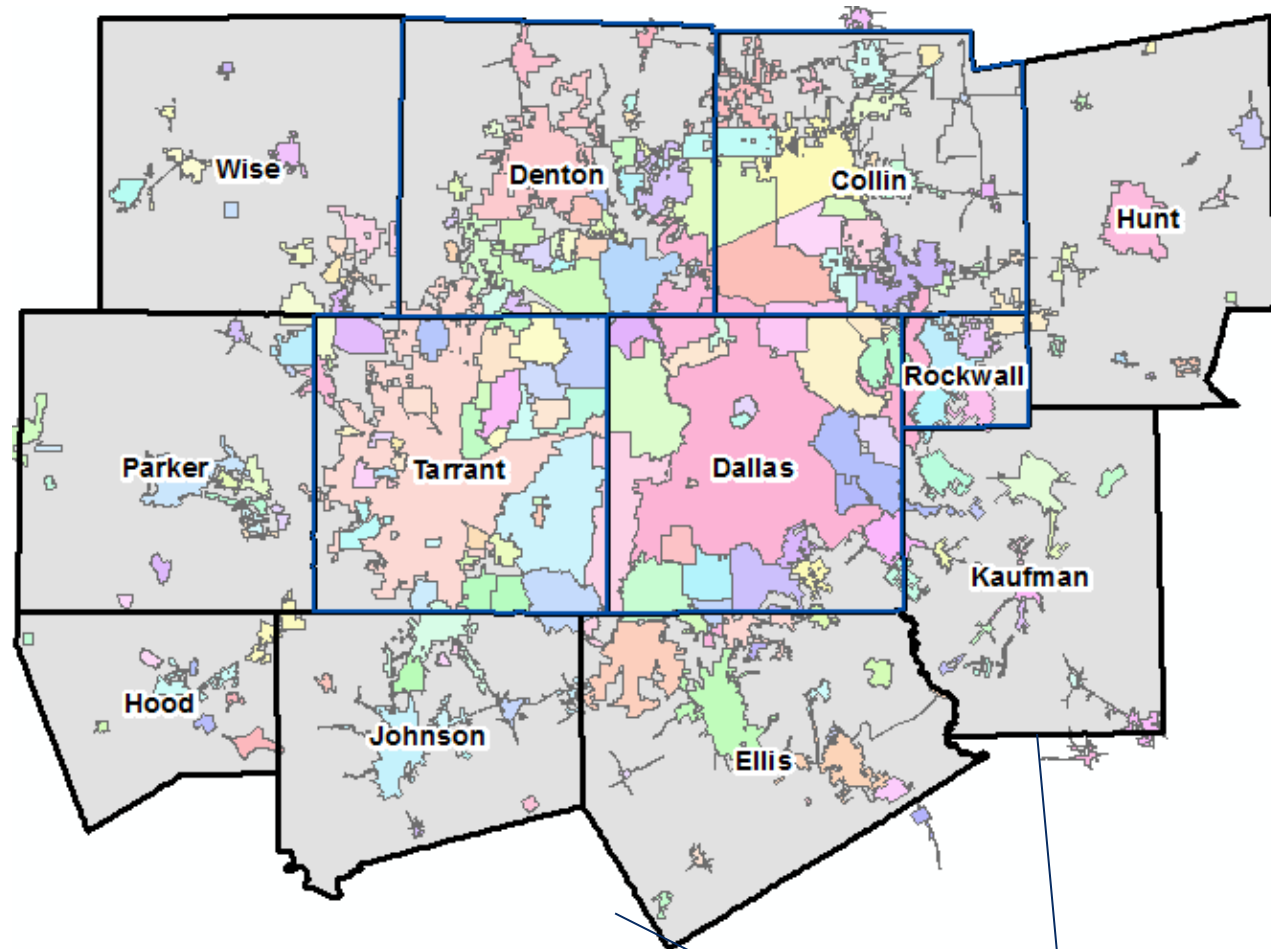

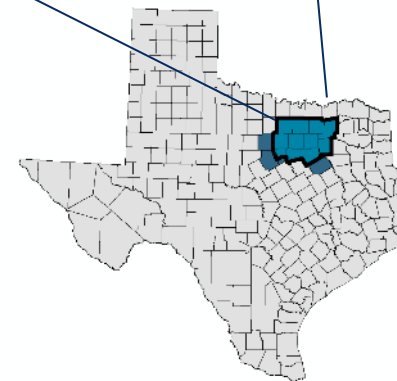

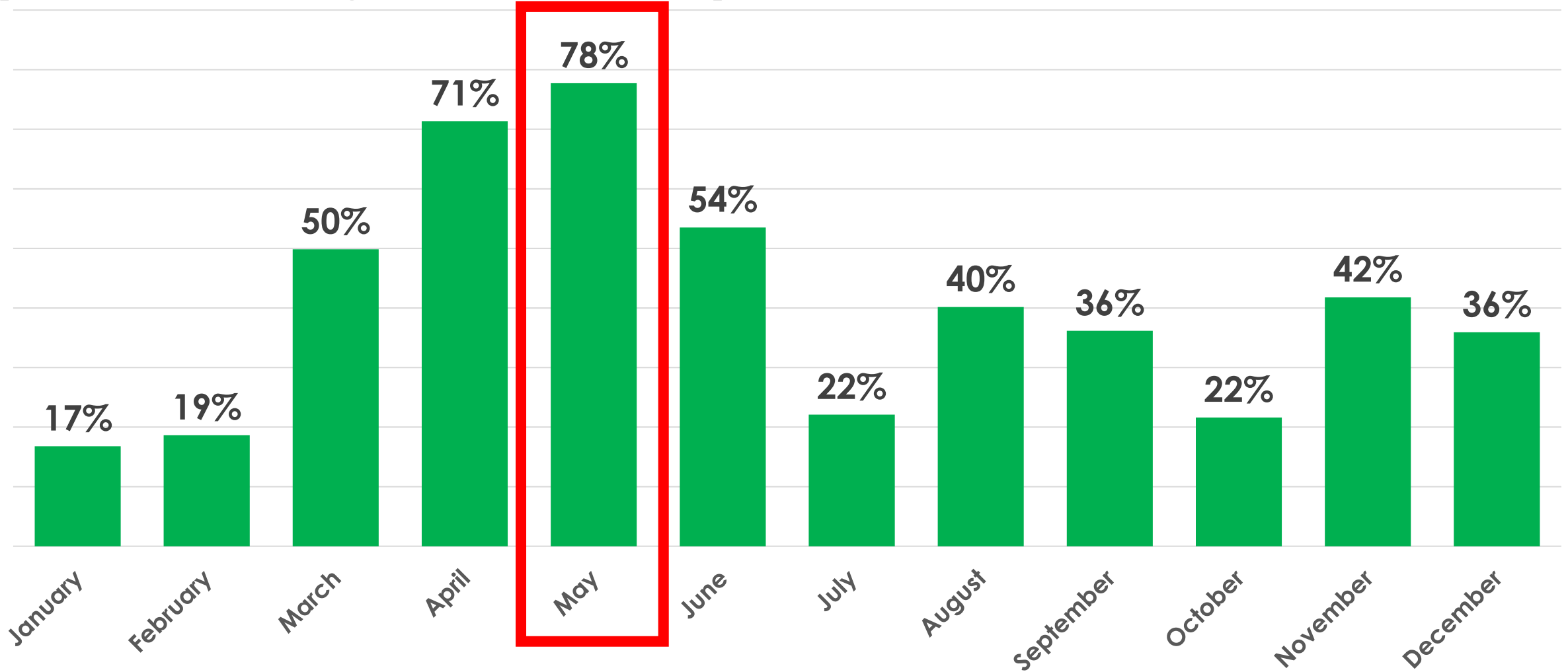

(Percent Change 2019 vs 2020)

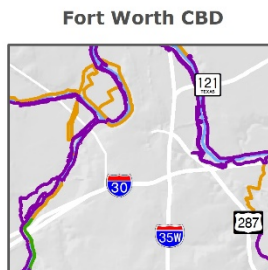
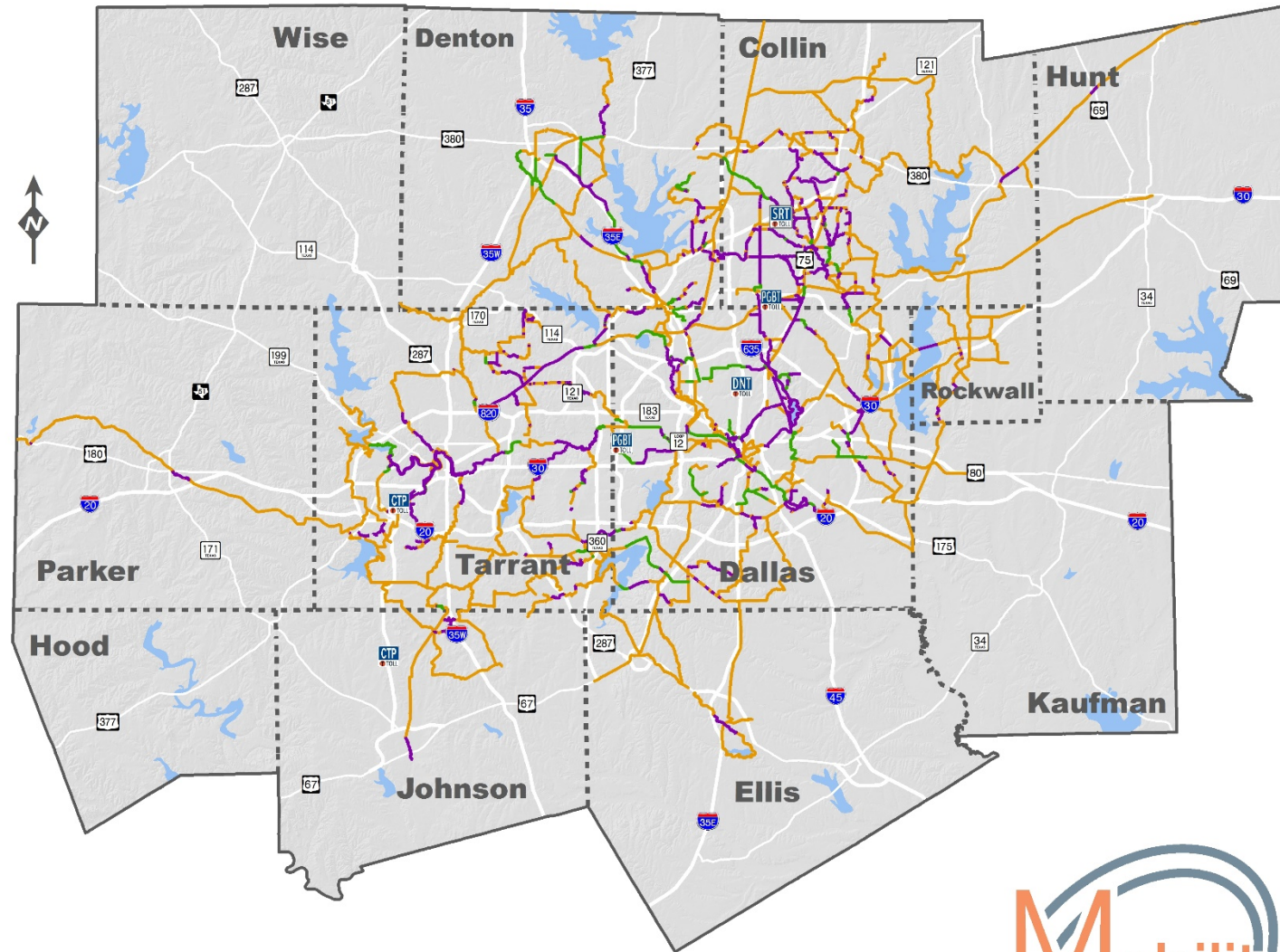

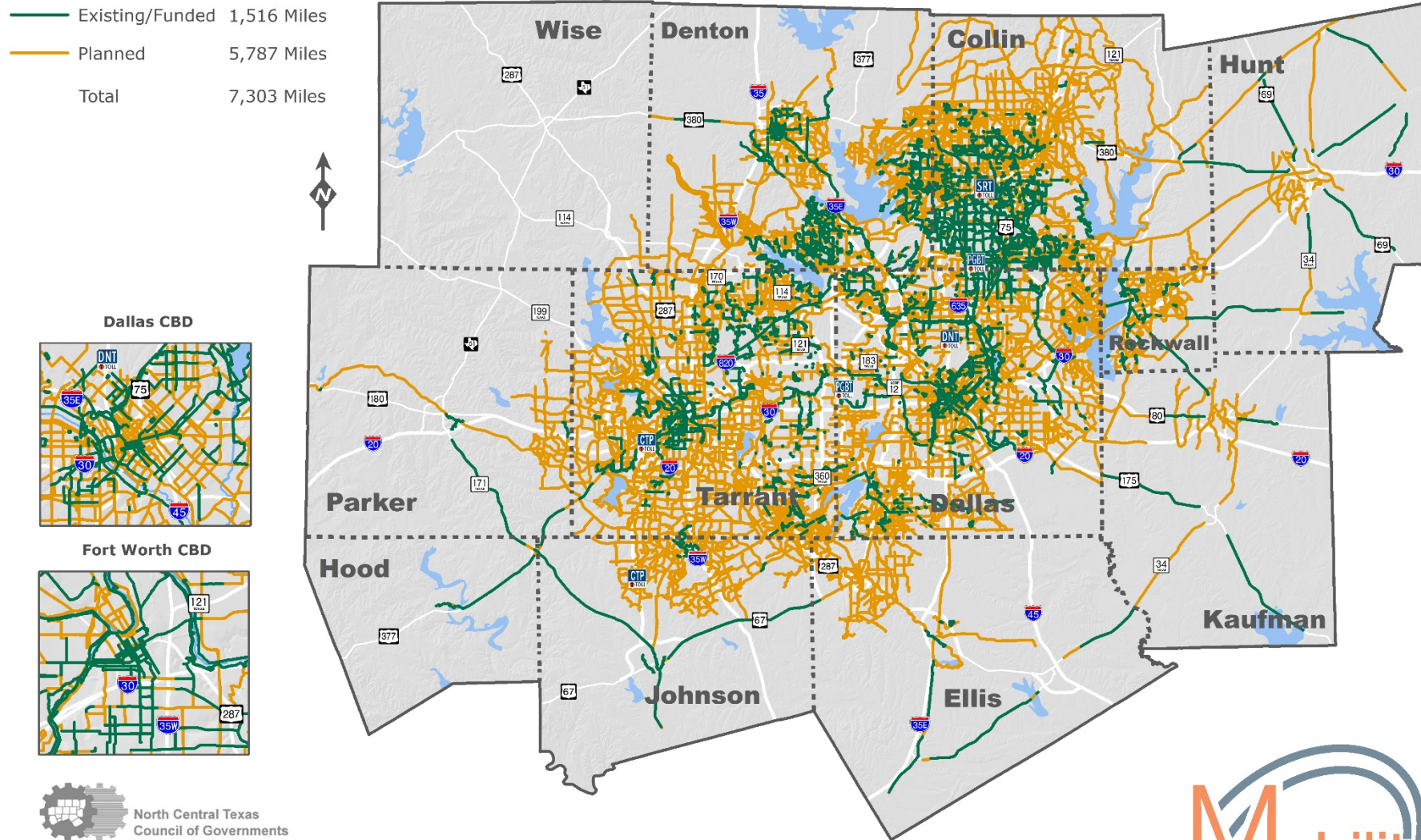

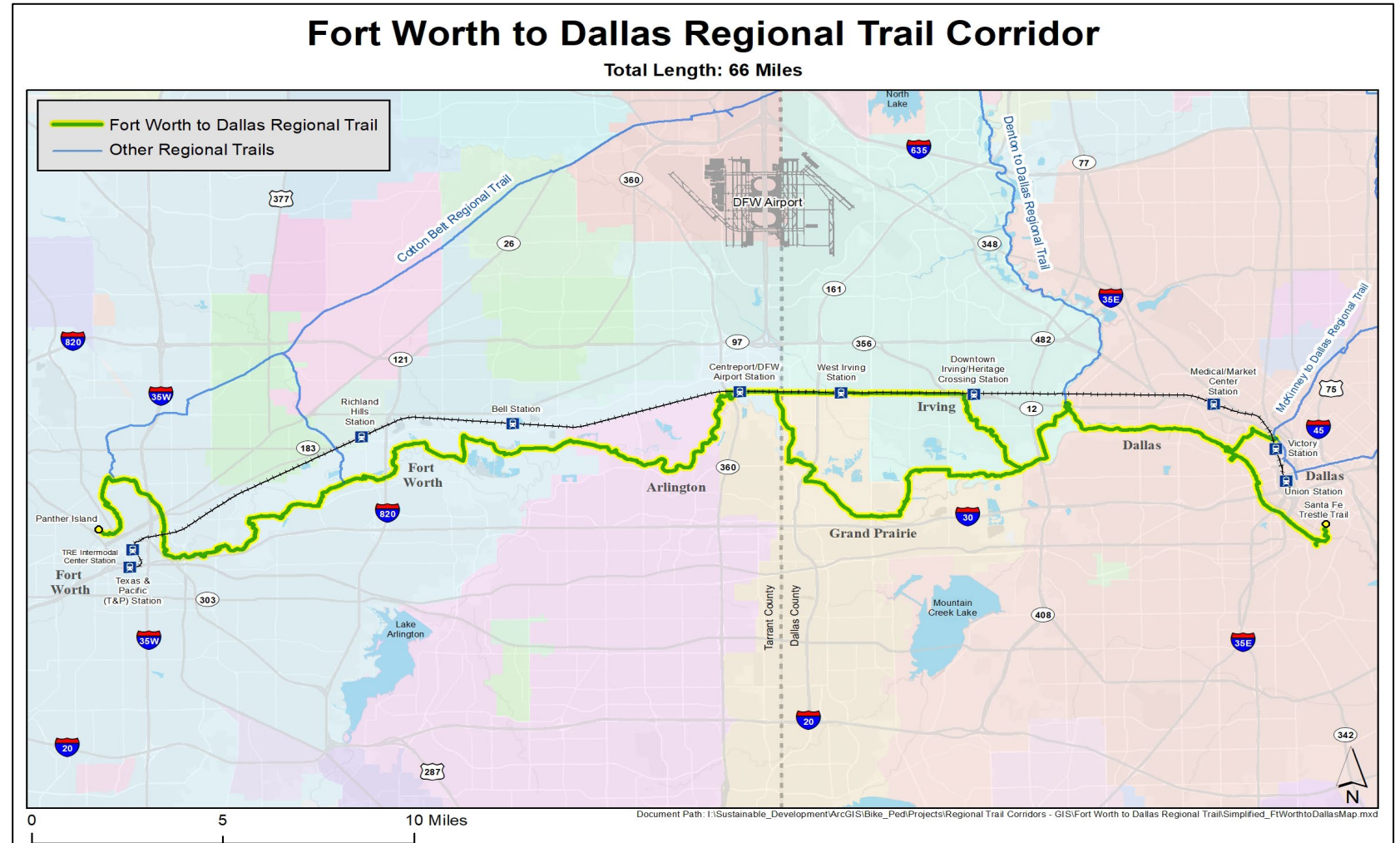

Trails and On-Street Bikeways Network

Many cities and counties in the region have developed and adopted bicycle master plans, trail master plans, or a combination of both. Various communities are also developing plans for local pedestrian networks and programs to provide safe routes to schools. Numerous cities and transportation agencies have adopted local policies for bicycle accommodations to encourage bicycling as a form of transportation. The number of locally adopted community bicycle and trail master plans in the region grows each year. These documents were used in the development of [Mobility 2045](#) to ensure regional connectivity and continuity.

The active transportation network in the region consists of 7,303 miles of regional shared-use paths (Regional Veloweb), supporting community shared-use paths, and the on-street bikeway network (including on-street wide shoulders in rural areas) in various stages of development. This network plays a key role in supporting Mobility 2045 and the implementation of the multimodal Complete Streets and transit infrastructure that assist in safely accommodating all travelers throughout the region. **Local trails** make up 775 miles of this network, with many more planned.

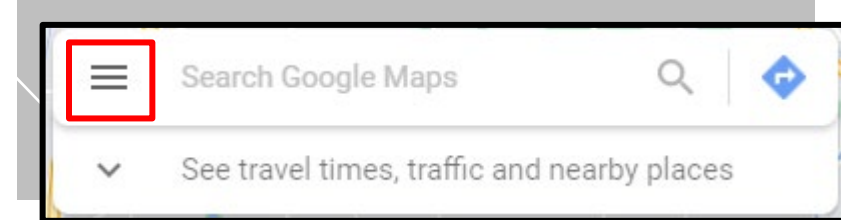

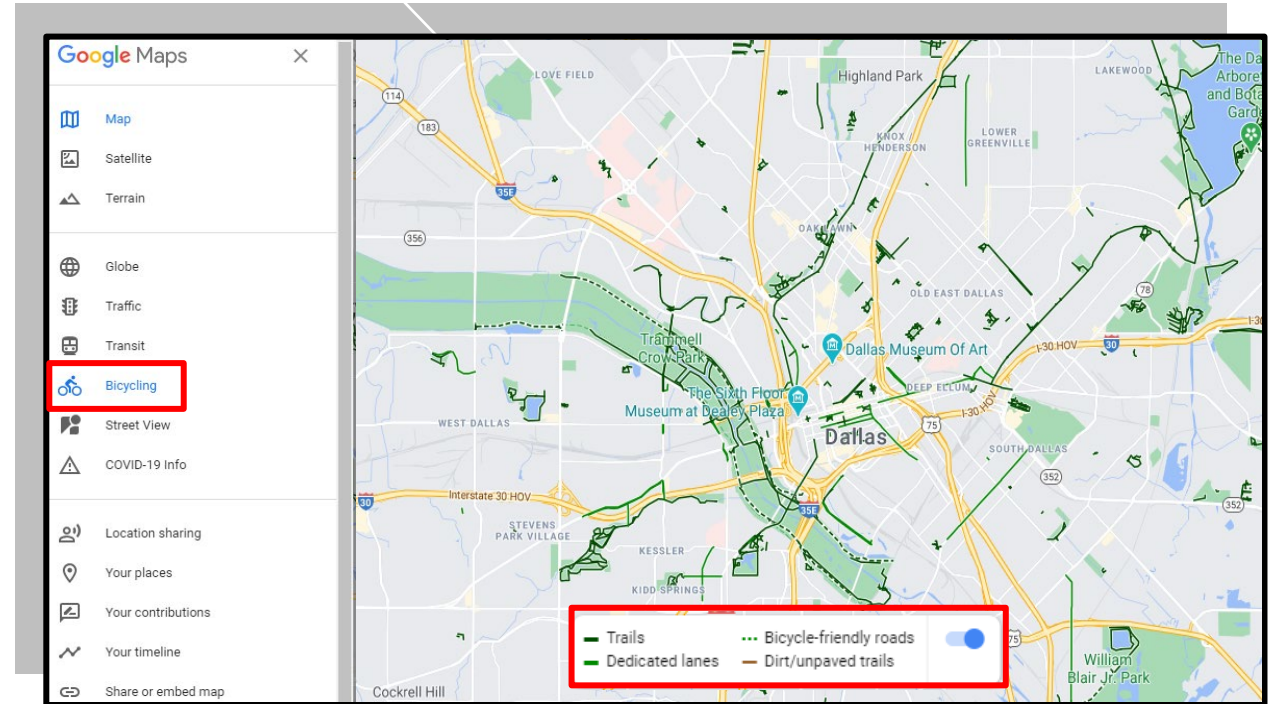

SLIDE 1 - Introduction Slide

Hello, I am Kevin Kokes, and I want to thank you for being here today. I am a program manager with the Sustainable Development Team in the Transportation Department of the North Central Texas Council of Governments. Our team at the Council of Governments oversees active transportation planning for bicycle and pedestrian facilities across the twelve-county Dallas-Fort Worth Metropolitan Planning area.

Today I will provide a brief overview of trails and on-street bikeway planning for our metropolitan area, and I will also highlight several regionally significant trail corridors that are in various stages of planning, engineering design, and construction. Each of these trails includes a partnership for implementation by the Council of Governments, local communities and TxDOT.

SLIDE 2 – Texas Metropolitan Planning Organizations

The Council of Governments serves as the transportation planning organization for the twelve-county Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan planning area, which is one of 25 located around the state of Texas, there are more than 420 metropolitan planning organizations around the country.

The map on this slide identifies the location of our Dallas-Fort Worth planning area, located within the state.

SLIDE 3 – North Central Texas Council of Governments

This slide identifies how our region is divided between three TxDOT districts. The Fort Worth TxDOT District is located on the west, the Dallas District is located on the east, and Hunt County is included within the Paris District.

Today's public hearing for TxDOT includes the Western and Eastern Subregions for the Fort Worth and Dallas Districts.

SLIDE 4 – North Central Texas Council of Governments

The Council of Governments planning area encompasses more than 200 cities, ranging from rural towns to urban areas. In addition to the two largest cities of Dallas and Fort Worth there are 13 other cities with more than 100,000 residents in population.

In 2020, our population across the region was estimated to be 7.6 million residents. By 2045, our population across the region is expected to grow by nearly 4 million additional residents, to over 11.2 million people.

As a regional planning organization, the Council of Governments works collaboratively with, but does not make decisions for, individual municipalities and

agencies. TxDOT, cities, and counties manage construction projects, also local governments make land use decisions and school districts make school siting decisions.

SLIDE 5 – Monthly Trail Usage

The COVID-19 pandemic had significant impact on transportation in 2020, leading to a significant decrease in the travel volumes of nearly every mode of transportation including personal vehicles, rail and bus transit, and commercial airlines. However, walking and bicycling travel on trails in the Dallas-Fort Worth region experienced significant increases in 2020 when compared to 2019.

As shown on this slide, in 2020 the significant increases began early in the year before COVID shelter in place restrictions occurred, and then steadily increased later in the year with a dramatic peak of increase in trail usage of more than 70% during the months of April and May.

Strong increases in trail usage occurred throughout the remaining months of 2020.

SLIDE 6 – Regional Veloweb

The next series of slides identify trails and on-street bikeways included in the metropolitan transportation plan adopted by the Regional Transportation Council. This plan serves as the guide for investing in transportation infrastructure across our planning area.

This slide identifies the Regional Veloweb network of nearly 1,900 miles of trails.

These are prioritized trails intended to provide connections between cities and counties across the region.

This map identifies the regional network, which is in various stages of development, of either existing, funded, or planned facilities.

SLIDE 7 – Community Shared-Use Paths

The map on this slide identifies Community Shared Use Paths with nearly an additional 3,000 miles of trails in various stages of development. These trail corridors are more local in nature and tend to be located in suburban communities that are experiencing new growth in previously undeveloped areas. These trails provide connections to the Regional Veloweb network.

SLIDE 8 – On-Street Bikeway Network

The map on this slide identifies on-street bikeways in various stages of development by local communities based on their adopted master plans. More than 2,400 miles of these facilities are identified in the plan, typically consisting of bikeways such as on-street striped bike lanes.

SLIDE 9 – Combined Regional Veloweb, Community Paths, and On-Street Bikeway Network

All together the combined network of Regional Veloweb, Community Paths, and

On-street Bikeways will result more than 7,300 miles of facilities. About 1,500 miles exist today, however about 80% of this total combined network is still in the planning stage and is expected to be completed by 2045.

SLIDE 10 – TxDOT’s Bicycle Tourism Trails Study

In addition to the regional trails and bikeway network, there is also a statewide network of bikeways identified by TxDOT’s Bicycle Tourism Trails Study and represented on this slide. Bonnie Sherman highlights this statewide network in her presentation about bicycle planning across the state of Texas.

Of note on this slide are several trail corridors of regional significance that extend through our Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area and will one day provide connections to major cities around the state and to neighboring states.

SLIDE 11 – Ellis County (Midlothian-Waxahachie Regional Trail)

Okay, so now what you all have been waiting for, and that is the highlights of several regional trail corridors that are under various stages of development in our region. The first corridor that I will highlight is located in Ellis County, and is a corridor that will stretch from Midlothian to Waxahachie.

SLIDE 12 – Ellis County (Midlothian-Waxahachie Regional Trail)

Recently, the Council of Governments, in partnership with the cities of Midlothian and Waxahachie completed preliminary engineering for the nearly 10-mile alignment that will stretch between the two cities.

The map on this slide identifies the sections of the trail that will be completed within in each city's jurisdiction.

In April of this year, federal transportation funding was approved by the Regional Transportation Council for the first two phases of construction of this trail. A northern phase will begin in Midlothian and extend southward from Midlothian Parkway. A southern phase will connect at Getzendarner Park in Waxahachie and extend north to FM 875.

The TxDOT Dallas District will be coordinating with both cities on these trail construction projects.

SLIDE 13 – Fort Worth Bomber Spur Trail

The next regional trail corridor I will highlight is located in western Fort Worth and is known as the Bomber Spur Trail, which is a rails to trails project.

SLIDE 14 – Fort Worth Bomber Spur Trail

Preliminary engineering for a portion of this trail corridor was completed earlier this year from Vickery Boulevard near the intersection of SH 183 on the south, northward to Calmont Avenue, which is located just south of Interstate 30.

Ultimately when this entire Bomber Spur corridor is complete, it will form a large trail loop combined with the West Fork Trinity Trail and the Clear Fork Trinity Trail connecting residents in western Fort Worth to downtown.

SLIDE 15 – Fort Worth Bomber Spur Trail

Preliminary engineering was completed for a 3.1 mile stretch of this trail, which provided design schematics, opinions of construction costs, and identified locations for bridges and safety measures at roadway crossings. This engineering effort was a partnership by the Council of Governments, City of Fort Worth, and Streams & Valleys.

This past month, the Regional Transportation Council approved funding to construct this first phase of trail from Calmont Avenue on the north to Camp Bowie/US377 which will include a new trail bridge over that roadway. As a result, the TxDOT Fort Worth District will be coordinating with the City of Fort Worth to implement this section of trail for construction.

SLIDE 16 – Cotton Belt Regional Trail

The next regionally significant trail I will highlight is the Cotton Belt Regional Trail. This is a corridor stretching nearly 55 miles from near downtown Fort Worth, through the mid cities in Tarrant County, through northern Dallas County, and into southern Plano in Collin County.

SLIDE 17 – Cotton Belt Regional Trail

This slide identifies the number of cities, counties, and rail transit stations that will ultimately be connected by the entire Cotton Belt Trail corridor.

Currently, the City of Grapevine and TxDOT are completing construction on a section of the trail near downtown Grapevine and has engineering design underway for the next phase of the trail heading eastward along the TexRail corridor leading into DFW Airport.

Also of note is the Dallas Area Rapid Transit Agency currently has engineering design underway for nearly 24 miles of the Cotton Belt Trail that ultimately implement phases from DFW Airport to Shiloh Station in Plano. Sections of that trail alignment are anticipated to open with the Silver Line Commuter Rail project and ultimately connect with nine rail stations managed by DART.

SLIDE 18 – Denton to Dallas Regional Veloweb Trail

Another significant trail corridor in the region extends from downtown Denton to downtown Dallas. This is a nearly 52-mile trail alignment as identified on this map, and provides connections to numerous rail stations, historic downtowns, and major employment centers in Denton County and Dallas County.

SLIDE 19 – Denton to Dallas Regional Veloweb Trail

This slide identifies the trail alignment that connects with many cities across the two counties including nearby connections to rail stations in the DCTA and DART rail networks.

This past year, preliminary engineering was completed on an eight-mile stretch of

the trail corridor from the DCTA Hebron Station in southern Lewisville extending to the Campion Trail near the border of Coppell and Irving.

The Regional Transportation Council recently awarded funding for construction of the trail section in southern Lewisville connecting to Carrollton. As a result, this project will be implemented by the city in collaboration with the TxDOT Dallas District.

SLIDE 20 – Fort Worth to Dallas Regional Veloweb Trail

The last regional corridor to be highlighted today is the Fort Worth to Dallas Regional Trail which extends nearly 66 miles in total from downtown Fort Worth to downtown Dallas.

SLIDE 21 – Fort Worth to Dallas Regional Veloweb Trail

This trail corridor extends through five cities in Tarrant and Dallas counties, with nearly 13 miles of the trail funded for construction. These sections of the trail are expected to be complete and open by late 2023. Both the Fort Worth and Dallas TxDOT Districts are coordinating with the cities in this corridor for construction on these phases.

SLIDE 22 – Regional Collaboration

As noted on this slide, the trail through the five cities is a long-term vision that is finally becoming reality. This trail has been included in the Metropolitan

Transportation Plan since 1996.

SLIDE 23 – Trail Branding

An upcoming effort that will begin by summer of 2021 involves the development of a unified trail name and branding for effort this regional trail corridor. The five cities and the Council of Governments are coordinating this trail branding effort, with the goal to have signage installed by the time the entire trail opens in late 2023. This slide identifies examples of what this branding and signage may look like.

SLIDE 24 – Regional Network

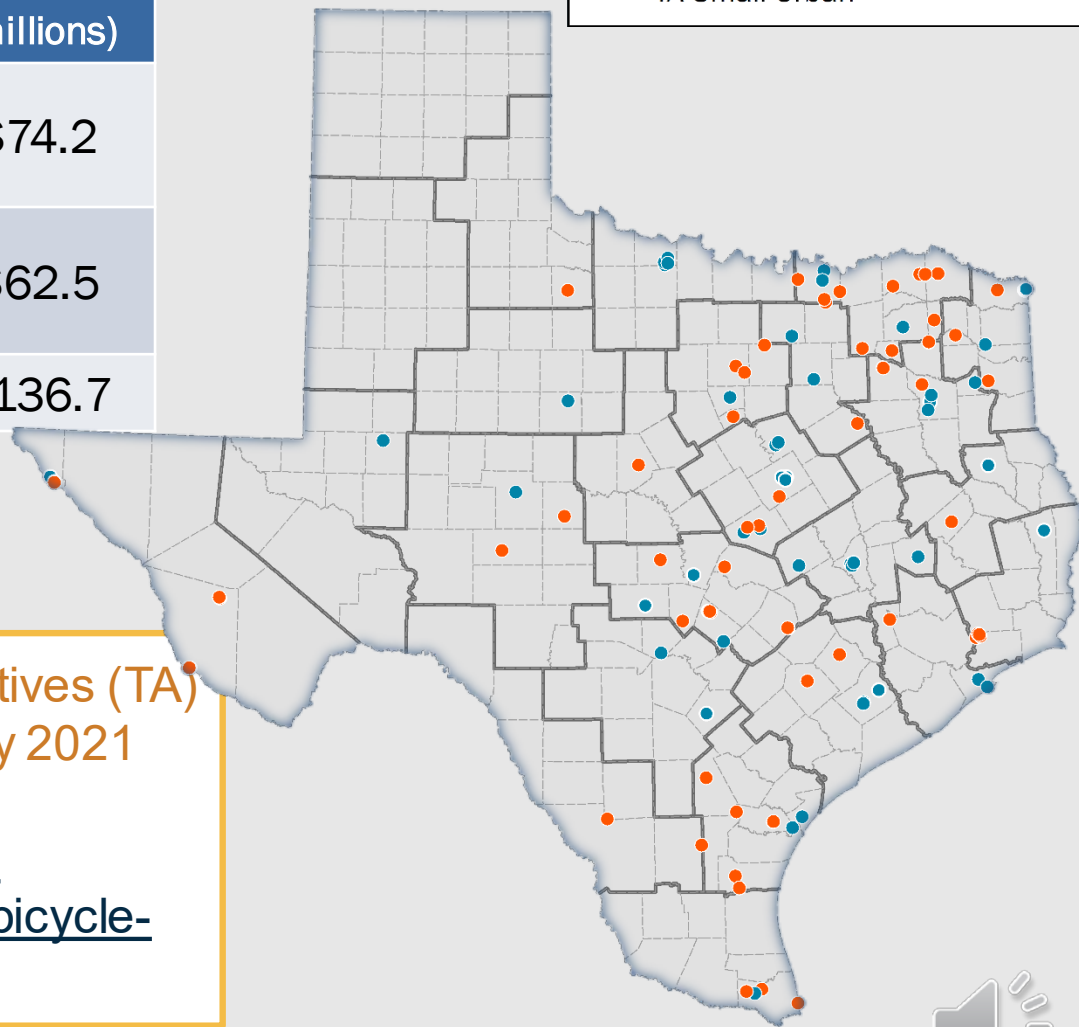

VIRTUAL PUBLIC HEARING SCRIPT

Slide 1: Hello! I'm Bonnie Sherman and I'm TxDOT's statewide bicycle and pedestrian program manager. I wanted to share a few of the exciting efforts to support bicycling across the state that are underway. If you'd like to learn more about TxDOT's statewide Bicycle and Pedestrian Program, go to [txdot.gov](https://www.txdot.gov) and type the word "bicycle" in the search box.

Slide 2: TxDOT has a long-standing committee of citizen who advise the department on policies that affect bicycling and walking including the design, construction, and maintenance of highways. This year, the committee was formally expanded to include pedestrian issues, so TxDOT will be specifically targeting recruitment efforts this year on representatives of pedestrian and accessibility needs. We accept applications from interested members of the bicycling and pedestrian community annually in May. Visit with your District Bicycle & Pedestrian Coordinator or check our website to learn more.

Slide 3: One exciting project TxDOT developed with its Bicycle Advisory Committee is the Texas Bicycle Tourism Trails Study. This study identified a potential network of long-distance bikeways to support tourism and economic development across the state. We envision this network as being collaboratively developed, incrementally over time, through local, state, federal, and nonprofit partnerships. A link to the study and maps is included on this slide. Some trail projects presented here today coincide with the bicycle tourism network.

Slide 4: Recently, TxDOT has been working with members of the Bicycle & Pedestrian Advisory Committee to generate recommendations on how to better address the needs of bicyclists and pedestrians when developing roadway projects, including data collection and developing TxDOT District bike plans. This group is also generating guiding principles based on best practices in bikeway design that are informing updates to TxDOT's design guidance as well as other policies and procedures to come.

Slide 5: Last month, TxDOT updated its bicycle accommodations guidance as part of a series of revisions to the state's roadway design manual. The new bikeway design guidance is intended to assist engineers in determining safe and comfortable bicycle accommodations that are appropriate to the land use context and roadway characteristics and accommodate the interested but concerned bicyclists. The guidance was developed based on national research, standards, and guidelines that are rapidly evolving. Projects that are still in the early stages of development must comply with the new guidance, so you will begin to see more separated bike facilities and shared use paths included in TxDOT roadway projects across the state in the near future, replacing the shared lane concepts of the past.

Slide 6: Lastly, my office administers the Statewide Transportation Alternatives Program. TxDOT's TA Program, as it's called, provides federal funding to build walking and bicycling infrastructure in small and

medium-sized communities located outside of major metro areas. Local entities are eligible to apply for these funds. We opened a competitive call for projects in early 2021 and received applications from every TxDOT District in the state. Projects are anticipated to be identified for funding later this fall. In the past, we have funded a number of bicycle and pedestrian projects from the DFW area. Thank you for taking the time to visit this hearing and learn about what's ahead for bicyclists and pedestrians in your community!

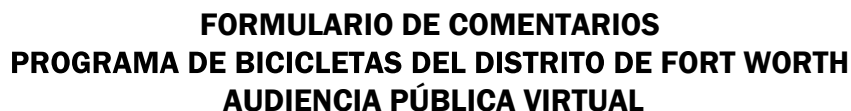

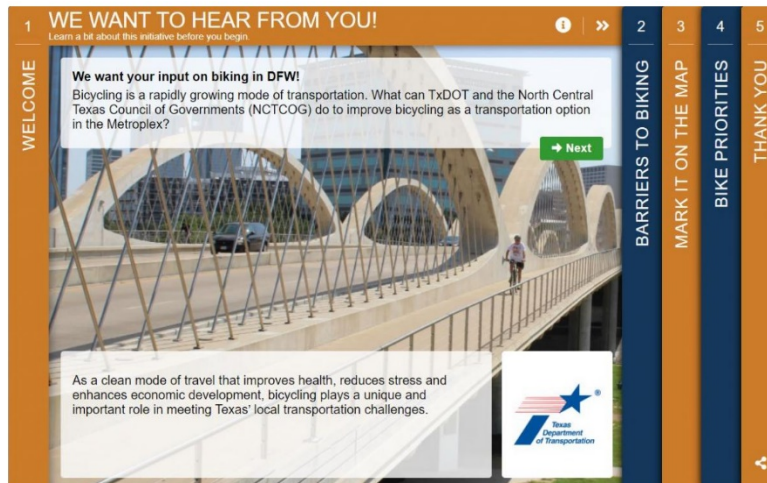

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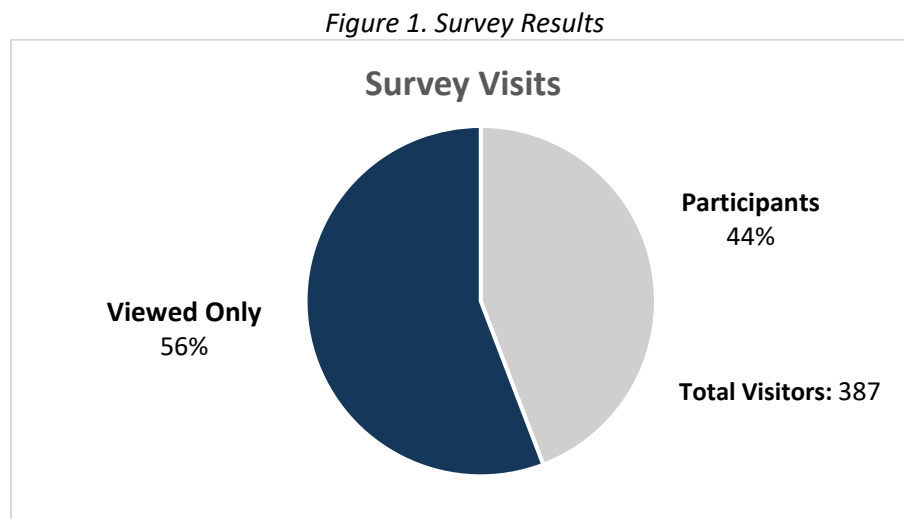


G. MetroQuest survey results

Introduction:

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) utilized an online engagement survey (MetroQuest) from May 6, 2021 to May 21, 2021 to gather public input for the Fort Worth District's Bike Plan within the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) region. The survey was part of a virtual public hearing for bicycle use on the state highway system. An in-person meeting to obtain public input was not held due to COVID-19 restrictions on in-person meetings and the safety of the public. A link to the online survey remained active on the TxDOT project webpage throughout the duration of the survey period.

The survey had a total of 387 visits over the 15-day active period. Out of those visits, 171 visitors participated in the survey (44%), and 216 of the visitors viewed but did not interact with the survey (56%). **Figure 1** shows the share of visitors who participated in the survey and those who only viewed.



Questions included in the survey can be found on the online engagement survey screen shots in **Attachment A**. The components of the survey included: Barriers to Biking, Mark it on the Map, Bike priorities, and an optional demographics questionnaire. Results for each section are summarized below.

Barriers to Biking

The survey began with a question asking the respondents to rank what they considered the most significant barriers to bicycling. This public input is used by TxDOT and NCTCOG to investigate measures to improve safety and accessibility for bicyclists in the region. Participants were asked to choose their top three barriers from the list found below. Participants only ranked their top three concerns; remaining concerns were not ranked.

- No Bike Parking
- Bad Driver Behaviors
- No Designated Space
- Traffic
- Limited Access
- Disconnected Bikeways
- Poor Pavement Conditions

Table 1 depicts the average ranking for each of the seven barriers as it was ranked among a participant's top three concerns. Since participants ranked their top three concerns from one, being their highest concern, to three, being their third highest concern, a lower Ranking Average equates to being of higher concern.

As indicated in **Table 1**, Bad Driver Behavior ranked highest among participants' concerns for the listed barriers. Bad Driver Behaviors, No Designated Space, and Disconnected Bikeways were placed among the top three concerns out of all possible barriers. Disconnected Bikeways was observed most frequently within the top three concerns.

Mark it on the Map

An interactive map page was provided where participants were asked to drop markers to identify places within the Fort Worth District that might be problematic for a bicyclist or need specific attention. Participants were able to input five different marker types. The five markers included Starting Point, Destinations, Intersection Issues, Bike Issues, or Bike Barriers. While placing markers, participants were asked to comment on the specifics of what they have encountered at that location. **Table 2** shows the number of times each type of marker was identified on the interactive map and the number of comments left for each marker.

Bike issues were identified the greatest number of times (133) out of the proposed constraints, and Starting Point had the fewest number (46). In addition to being identified the most, Bike Issues also had the most comments. Locations mapped by participants in the Mark it on the Map screen, as well as the comments pertaining to the locations, will be shared by TxDOT with applicable municipalities so they could examine the identified constraints.

Bike Priorities

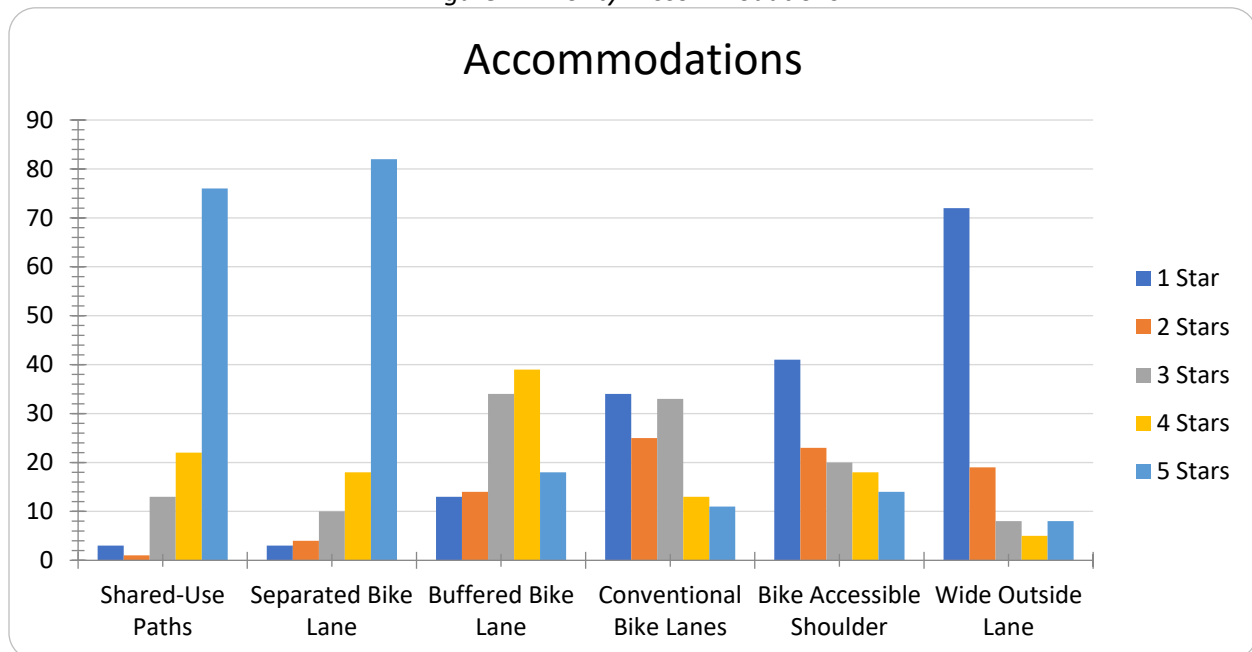


Figure 3. Priority: Safety

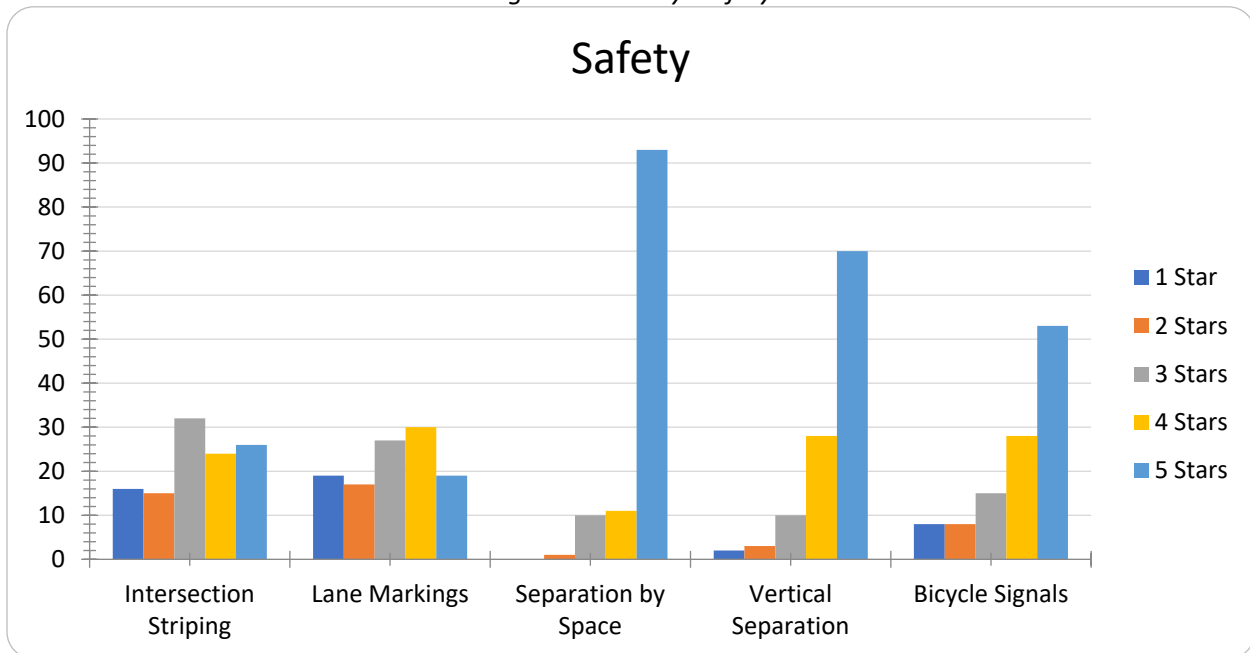
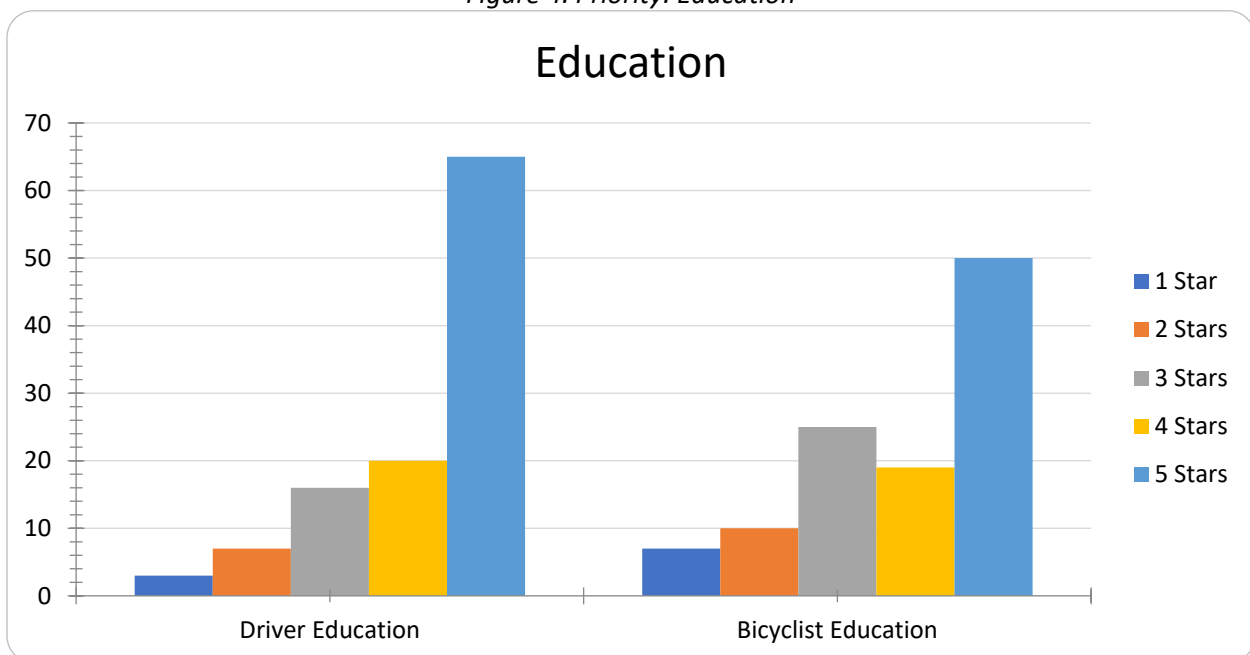


Figure 4. Priority: Education

Survey participants were asked to rate items in three different categories: Accommodations, Safety, and Education. Within each of the three categories are a set of sub-topics that the participants rated from 1 (least preferred) to 5 (most preferred) stars based on preference for the consideration. In the Accommodations category, the survey asked participants to rate their comfort levels while using several bikeway facilities. In the Safety category, the survey asked participants to rate the value of several safety measures. In the Education category, the survey asked participants to rate where the focus of planned education materials should be placed. **Figure 2, Figure 3, and Figure 4** show the results of the participant's priorities within the three categories.

Figure 2. Priority: Accommodations

Survey results reveal strong respondent preferences within each of the three categories listed. The Accommodations table shows that respondents largely gave Separated Bike Lanes and Shared-Use Paths 5-Star ratings while Wide Outside Lane was largely given a 1-star rating. The Safety graphic shows that Separation of Space, Vertical Separation, and Bicycle Signals have the highest number of 5-star ratings among the safety measures, and Lane Markings having the lowest amount of 5-star ratings. User preferences are similar between the Accommodations category (Shared-Use Paths, Separated Bike Lanes) and the Safety category (Separation by Space, Vertical Separation). The Education figure shows that

participants value both Bicyclist and Driver Education with 5 stars as the most popular rating, with approximately 15 more 5-star ratings for Driver Education.

Optional Demographics Questionnaire

The last section of the survey asked participants to provide optional demographic information, which included questions on how often participants ride their bike (see **Table 3**).

Most survey respondents (52%) indicated that they ride their bike two (2) or three (3) days a week, with the second largest group of respondents (28%) being those that ride four (4) or more days a week. A few survey participants (2%) indicated that they never ride.

The optional demographics questionnaire also asked participants what their destinations are when riding. Results are summarized in **Table 4**.

When asked about destinations when riding, 43% of participants identified Health or Exercise as their reason to ride. The second largest group of respondents (31%) identified recreation. Work and Shopping/Errands were both listed as destinations by 11% of survey participants. Entertainment was not designated as a ride destination by survey participants.

Comment Summary

Each step of the survey allows the participant to leave an optional comment. This gives a participant the opportunity to provide more specific responses and added detail to the question and tasks within the survey. **Table 5** below depicts the distribution of comments among the survey sections.

The stats shown in **Table 5** show that most comments came from the Mark it on the Map section, containing almost 70% of total comments. Bike Ranking received the least number of comments, making up 3% of the total. The Demographic Wrap Up statistic reflects the open ended “Additional Comments” section on the last page of the survey, which is where participants could leave a final comment that does not pertain to one specific component of the bike plan or survey.

Conclusion:

Within a 15-day survey period from May 6, 2021 to May 21, 2021 the on-line MetroQuest survey for the NCTCOG region received 387 visitors. Of the 387 visitors, 171 (44%) participated and responded to the different survey questions and tasks, while the others (56%) only viewed the survey's contents. Bad Driver Behavior was identified as the biggest barrier for bicyclists, and Limited Access was of least concern. The Mark it on the Map activity provided 122 comments and 133 possible Bike Issue locations. Under the Bike Priorities section, Separated Bike Lanes and Shared-Use Paths largely received 5-star ratings under the Accommodations category. Separation of Space received the largest number of 5-star ratings among the Safety category. Driver Education and Cyclist Education received large shares of 5-star ratings under the Education category. About half (52%) of the participants who filled out the optional questionnaire identified that they ride their bike two (2) or three (3) times per week; 28% of those who filled out the optional questionnaire identified that they ride their bike four (4) or more times per week. Ride destinations are largely comprised by Health and exercise (43%) and recreation (31%) purposes. A total of 744 comments were gathered from the 387 visitors, with most comments originating from the Mark it on the Map section. Locations mapped by participants in the Mark it on the Map screen, as well as the comments pertaining to the locations, will be shared by TxDOT with applicable municipalities so they could examine the identified constraints.


